TEAM HISTORY



IN THE BEGINNING

On a cold, crisp day in January 2005, Dan Chapman walked into a near-empty office located on Main Street in downtown Stockton with just one desk and an office chair, and the Stockton Hockey Franchise Group officially set up shop.

What began with just a desk light now has turned into a spotlight large enough to cover the Central Valley sports scene.

February came and the team would begin selling season tickets for the first time. On February 5, 2005, over 600 season tickets were sold to fans that lined up early in the morning to be the first to purchase tickets for Stockton's new team.

Throughout the year, the Thunder front office was a whirlwind of activity as new front office staff members were hired and the ground work was laid for the team's inaugural season.

The ECHL's Stockton Hockey Franchise Group was born when owner Michael Reinsdorf purchased the Atlantic City Boardwalk Bullies, only two seasons after the team won the ECHL's Kelly Cup Championship. Reinsdorf relocated the team to Stockton where a brand-new, state-of-the-art arena was being built.

During the summer, while construction crews worked around the clock on the arena and temperatures continuously reached over 100 degrees, the team continued to sell tickets at a fast pace to fans throughout the Central Valley.

On May 11, fans were introduced for the first time to Head Coach Chris Cichocki at an afternoon press conference at Valley Brew Family Restaurant. Two weeks later, on May 23, the hockey team taking the Central Valley by storm had a name that fit - the Thunder. The name was submitted by 11-year old Michelle Costa of Tracy.

After two impressive seasons in Atlantic City, it was clear there was only one man appropriate to announce as the Thunder's first player signing: goaltender Jake Moreland. Moreland's signing personified the first player on the Thunder roster in the image of what Chris Cichocki's team was to be in 2005-06: unrelenting, aggressive, and capable of the highlight play or save.

2005-06

The 2005-06 season began with a wave of fan support, as a throng of Thunder fans trekked south to Fresno's Save Mart Center on October 22, witnessing a Stockton comeback that fell painfully short in a 4-3 setback to the Fresno Falcons, marking the Thunder's ECHL debut.

Two weeks later, Stockton got another landmark: its first win in team history. The Thunder silenced a boisterous crowd of 13,001 at San Diego's iPayOne Center, knocking off the Gulls by a 4-3 overtime score, as Stephen Slonina repetitively jammed at a rebound located at the top of the crease and etched a date for the history books.

Through all the buildup and hype that surrounded the much heralded opening of the new arena, the night of December 10, 2005 not only went down as a historical night for Stockton hockey, but for the changing lifestyle of San Joaquin Valley residents. The new arena promised to be the start of many new entertainment options for Stockton residents in the months to come.

Fans came in droves for the red-letter game as the Thunder matched-up against the Phoenix RoadRunners. A sellout crowd of 10,117 witnessed a 4-0 Thunder blanking over Phoenix, which included Moreland's shutout of 22 saves to post the first shutout in Thunder history. Mike Lalonde christened the new arena by scoring the game's first goal on a first-period power play tally, while Slonina shined with a two-goal game, including a third-period breakaway goal to put away Phoenix.

The Thunder even got involved with the Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy, sending forward Maris Ziedins to the hockey championship tournament as a member of Team Latvia. Ziedins scored a goal during the tournament, notching a mark for Stockton in the world's most important international winter sports competition.

Riding tweaks to the roster and the multiplying fan base, the Thunder finished the 2005-06 season unbeaten in 13 of their final 20 games, with Moreland

setting a club record for most saves in one season (1,412), overcoming a recurring hip injury that nearly sidelined him for the season in February.

But by far the most exciting things in Stockton were happening in the stands. Each game, more and more fans were taking residence in ThunderLand. During the final home game of the season, the Thunder fans dethroned the Florida Everblades, who had been the league attendance kings for the past five seasons. The Thunder drew 30,562 fans to Stockton Arena in the final four regular season games, averaging over 7,000 per game to knock off the Everblades and capture the ECHL's attendance title with a total of 228,364 fans for all 36 home games during 2005-06.

The Thunder season ended on a high note when the team won its final game of the season with a 4-2 victory over San Diego. Over 9,000 fans cheered the team on that night. Most fans stayed well after the final buzzer sounded to see awards given to Joel Irwin (Leading Scorer), Dean Stork (Inaugural Team Captain) and Jake Moreland (MVP).

With the thrills of every Moreland save and strong finish, Cichocki set out to take the Thunder to the next level during the offseason – the right to play hockey in April and beyond.

All but four players who had 05-06 playing experience (Nathan Martz, Mike Lalonde, Steve Slonina and Jeff Lang) were ushered out or simply moved on. In place was new blood – fast, agile skaters who still maintained the playing style of Cichocki's team – the forechecking aggressiveness of a pit-bull.

The Phoenix Coyotes pulled out of an affiliation relationship with the Thunder, leaving Cichocki to search for one team that would match his playing style and raise the bar on player development for the NHL. In late August of 2006, the Edmonton Oilers came calling and signed a one-year pact with the Thunder, serving as a pipeline to rich talent that would carry the team to new heights.

2006-07

The Thunder got off to a roaring start in 2006-07, going unbeaten in 20 of its first 22 games (15-2-5 record). For their efforts, four Thunder players – Martz, Beau Geisler, Troy Bodie and Devan Dubnyk were chosen to the National Conference All-Star team, including Martz and Geisler's selection to the starting lineup. In the middle of a swift turnaround of the team, Cichocki was honored with his third selection to the All-Star Game as a head coach, tying a league all-time high with Alaska's Davis Payne and Gwinnett's Jeff Pyle.

The fans kept coming as well. Three sellouts and 10 games drew crowds of 8,000 or more at Stockton Arena were fueled by the California fan's unquenchable thirst for hockey and entertainment and the Thunder's way of giving back to the community, starting with "Thunder Goes Pink" weekend in November to celebrate breast cancer awareness.

For the second straight year, "Teddy Bear Toss" night drew in a nearly-packed house, as thousands of stuffed animals rained onto the ice following a Mike Lalonde shorthanded goal against Bakersfield in January and the animals were donated through the United Way of San Joaquin County afterwards.

What was also developing in the midst of the strong start was a springboard to higher levels for Thunder players. Tyler Spurgeon earned a promotion to the AHL with the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins and Bryan Young, who appeared in 17 games with Stockton, shot all the way up to Edmonton within two months, becoming the first former Thunder player to earn a spot with an NHL club.

As the Thunder closed on its first all-time Kelly Cup Playoff berth, the assignment of goal-scorer extraordinaire Brock Radunske and trade deadline acquisitions of defenseman Brian Lee from Gwinnett and Colin Pepperrall (free-agent signee) energized the team, winning an all-time club record 11 straight games, boosting the Thunder into the fifth seed of the playoffs.

In a wide-open field with no clear-cut favorite, the Thunder faced the Idaho Steelheads in the National Conference Quarterfinal, whom Stockton had taken 7 of 10 games from in the regular season. Yet, Idaho was loaded with playoff experience from its previous 2004 Kelly Cup championship team, which proved the best-of-seven game series would be no picnic.

Yet, the Thunder feasted on a Game 1 comeback, taking a 4-2 win in front of a silenced crowd at Qwest Arena after Tim Sestito scored one of the

biggest goals in Thunder history – a shorthanded goal with four minutes left in regulation to highlight a three-goal third period.

Idaho won the next two games in the series, including an 88-minute, double-overtime affair in Game 3 at Stockton Arena. But the Thunder bounced back in Game 4 with a 3-2 win to knot the series at 2-2. Yet, Idaho had an answer in the form of Lance Galbraith's overtime winner in Game 5, setting up Idaho's academic 6-1 win in Game 6 to close the Thunder season. Idaho eventually rode the wave of momentum and captured its second Kelly Cup title in four years.

2007-08

In 2007-08, higher expectations surrounded the Thunder in an off-season that produced free-agent signings of four players with ECHL All-Star Game experience, followed by a six-month period that involved the highs and lows of the ECHL All-Star Game, injuries, a wild opening night, call-ups, the Cincinnati Cyclones, down-to-the-wire finishes and another attendance title.

Following a stretch of losing their first three games, the Thunder began its quest for a second straight Kelly Cup Playoff appearance with their first win of the season – in convincing fashion – by trumping the Phoenix RoadRunners in a 4-0 triumph that helped rookie goaltender Glenn Fisher earn his first career shutout. Ryan O'Marra, the second player with first round NHL Draft experience to don a Thunder uniform, made a smashing debut with two goals in the victory.

Three nights later, the rallying cry of Thunder hockey, "Rated E For Excitement," took the home opener against the Alaska Aces and turned it into an Oscar Night premiere overtone. A red-carpet entrance was laid out for the fans of over 8,000 in attendance, a movie character costume contest was held at center ice and Thunder staff donned black-tie apparel.

The ending was also fit for the silver screen. Right winger David Rohlf's sent the crowd home with a happy ending after his one-timer from the left circle beat counterpart Derek Gustafson with 2:56 left in overtime.

The Thunder were in the middle of a 6-1-0 stretch in seven games and the ship seemed to be righted, receiving scoring in bunches from Andy Contois, Jacob Micflikier, O'Marra, Beau Geisler and rookie sensation Sebastian Bisailon, a 21-year old defenseman armed with a booming slapshot that helped produce four goals in just a six-game stretch during the period.

His first, a missile of a one-timer from the left point on November 2, helped the Thunder sink the Idaho Steelheads in a 4-0 victory that served many accomplishments. It was the first of back-to-back victories during "Thunder Goes Pink II" weekend, celebrating breast cancer awareness which was aided by over 17,000 fans in attendance for the two consecutive nights while the Thunder showed their support by donning pink-bolted jerseys and skating on a pink-accented ice surface.

In the first meeting since the 2007 first round playoff series which saw Idaho advance past the Thunder en route to a Kelly Cup title, the Thunder also served payback while Glenn Fisher set a club record with his second straight shutout. His streak would continue into a November 6 road game against the Phoenix RoadRunners, when his shutout streak of 153:48 set a team record.

However, injuries, call-ups and inconsistent play left the Thunder languishing at the .500 mark at the All-Star break and changes to the lineup were in store. Jesse Bennefield, who scored six goals in his first seven games, was shipped out to the Bakersfield Condors for hard-hitting defenseman L.P. Lachance and enforcer Spencer Carbery – an effort to mix more grit into a lineup filled with a surplus of finesse-oriented players.

A changing of the guard was on tap as goaltender Cam Ellsworth was dealt to the Pensacola Ice Pilots for future considerations, giving room for newcomer Tim Boron to step in after being claimed off waivers from the Charlotte Checkers.

Boron would go on to post three shutouts, a team record which started on December 27 against the Fresno Falcons in a 2-0 triumph. What helped make the subplot juicier was the return of Boron's counterpart and fellow St. Cloud State predecessor – Jake Moreland – who made his first return to Stockton Arena since tending the pipes for the Thunder during 2005-06.

The moment that thousands of hockey fans had waited for since the previous summer came on January 22-23, when the hockey world shined its spotlight on the city of Stockton for the ECHL All-Star Game, the crown jewel of a

continuous season-long celebration of the league's 20th anniversary. Thousands of tourists poured into the downtown waterfront events center for the week, aided by the ECHL Skills Competition on Jan. 22 and the inaugural ECHL Hall of Fame induction ceremony the morning after.

Three Thunder represented the hometown crowd in the Jan. 23 game televised nationally by NHL Network and aired throughout the country via NHL Radio, as Ryan MacMurchy, Brad Farynyuk and Andy Contois helped the National Conference take a 10-7 win.

The crowd of nearly 7,500 had their offensive appetite whet as the high-scoring affair was topped by a new offensive record, when Ash Goldie's hat trick and three assists set a new ECHL All-Star Game record with a six-point outing.

Following the week, it was back to reality for the Thunder, who still had a long road ahead in the final half of the season in attempts to lock up a postseason berth.

The Cincinnati Cyclones, who seemed to be destroying everything in their path on their way to a Brabham Cup title and Kelly Cup championship, hit a major speed bump along Fremont Street on March 1. Rising to the occasion in a playoff-like atmosphere, the Thunder and Boron (who made 42 saves) suffocated the Cyclones vaunted offense and snapped the team's league record 17-game winning streak in front of a raucous crowd of nearly 7,000. Rookie sensation David Desharnais, who would go onto win the league's scoring title by a whopping 15 points, had his league record 20-game assist streak snapped in the process.

A photo finish in the National Conference playoff race came down to the final weekend and a final hurdle stood in the way of the Thunder clinching their second straight playoff berth – the Utah Grizzlies – who had won 5 of 6 games against the Thunder that year entering the season-concluding three-game series.

However, the Las Vegas Wranglers gave the Thunder help by defeating the ninth-place Phoenix RoadRunners (who entered the weekend one point behind the Thunder) the final night of the regular season. The Thunder, who finally had life breathed back into their lineup with the return of Micflikier and Bisailon from the AHL, took advantage by posting two of the most dramatic finishes of the season in the final two games.

Following a 5-3 loss on April 3, the Thunder rebounded the next evening and beat the Grizzlies 6-5 when Brandon Schwartz scored a game-winning goal with 14 seconds left in the third period, set up by a Micflikier pass behind the Grizzlies net.

On the season's final night, the Thunder righted the ship after falling behind 3-0 in the second period and scored three unanswered goals, capped by Schwartz's deflection goal with 1:15 left in regulation which forced overtime and officially punched the team's playoff dance card, personified by an eruption of sticks, arms and voices on the bench when regulation time ended. Utah capped the game on Olivier Labelle's overtime goal and won 4-3.

What lied ahead was best-of-seven series against the Las Vegas Wranglers, who earned the best record in the National Conference. Like Utah, the Wranglers posed a serious hurdle as the Thunder had not won a game in Orleans Arena since March 28, 2006. Yet, as many coaches preach to their players to throw statistics out the window in the playoffs, the Thunder did likewise – and in dramatic fashion again.

Entering the third period with a 1-0 deficit in Game 1, the Thunder erupted for four goals and sunk the Wranglers in a 4-2 win, aided by Jonas Almtorp's shorthanded goal with 4:19 left.

Las Vegas got the best of the Thunder in the next three games, including two overtime wins in Games 2 and 4 for a commanding 3-1 series lead. The Thunder refused to go quietly and throttled the Wranglers for a 6-3 win at Stockton Arena in Game 5, aided by Stephane Goulet's hat trick – the first Thunder player to score three goals in a playoff game.

The stakes were raised in Game 6 and despite a valiant effort by the Thunder, the Wranglers proved to be too much and ended the series and the Thunder season in a 4-1 win at Las Vegas, en route to the club's first ever Kelly Cup Finals appearance.

For the fans who piled into Stockton Arena – 239,337 in total to garner the Thunder’s third straight attendance title, the rallying cry of “Rated E” certainly gave them exactly what they bargained for – excitement.

2008-09

Thunder fans had enjoyed calling themselves “top dog” when it came to loyalty for three seasons. An additional boost began with an increased dedication from the Edmonton Oilers and Springfield Falcons at helping players move onto the next level and strengthen the team’s talent depth.

Head Coach Chris Cichocki signed just seven players in the offseason as part of an agreement that had a whopping 19 players with an NHL contract or an AHL contract (including those inactive or on injured reserve) making the opening night roster via the Springfield Falcons. Ryan Huddy was one of them, whose offensive brilliance totaled 35 goals and 73 points that season, shattering Thunder scoring records.

Among other highlights was goaltender Andrew Perugini, assigned from Springfield, who became the second goaltender in Thunder history to win more than 20 games in a season (joining Dubnyk).

Expectations, again, rose for the Thunder who had a roster laden with talent, speed, grit and goaltending. But injuries and inconsistent play led the team to a 10-17-4 start to the regular season, ushering in change.

For the first time in Thunder history, the change involved the coaching staff. Cichocki was relieved of his duties on December 29, just 24 hours after a 5-2 loss at home to the Victoria Salmon Kings, which was the team’s fifth loss in a row and the tail-end of a 2-8-1 stretch in 11 games.

In came Matt Thomas, who had been a finalist for the first Thunder head coaching position in 2005-06 but over four years later, stepped in after his Fresno Falcons folded during the middle of the season. Coming full circle four years later, Thomas brought a brash attitude, a Kelly Cup ring, .636 lifetime winning percentage as coach, and an entertaining and up-tempo puck possession style all geared to turn the Thunder’s season around in a hurry.

The move paid off. Under Thomas’ guidance, the Thunder began the new era by winning seven games in a row amidst a 7-0-1 stretch in eight games with new additions to the roster that Thomas brought along from Fresno in all-stars Kenny MacAulay and Igor Gongalsky, defensemen Matt O’Dette, Daryl Marcoux and rookie sensation Judd Blackwater.

The Thunder were the talk of the ECHL by late January when the All-Star Game in Reading rolled around. Three members of the Thunder (Thomas, Cory Urquhart and Ryan Huddy) represented the National Conference while a fourth selection – MacAulay – took a detour to the AHL’s Portland Pirates for the remainder of the regular season by earning a well-deserved call-up.

With newfound confidence, the Thunder gained ground on the entire West Division and a 5-1 hammering of the first place Ontario Reign put them three points out of the top spot in early February. In December, the top spot seemed out of reach with the team languishing in fourth place.

Fans kept coming in droves to see the hottest sports attraction in the San Joaquin Valley and the Thunder saluted the loyal crowd by clinching its third consecutive Kelly Cup Playoff berth with a 3-1 victory over the Las Vegas Wranglers in the regular season home finale on March 29. With a crowd of 6,473, it was the fourth straight season that the Thunder led the ECHL in attendance.

The Thunder achieved their goals under Thomas – make the playoffs, and recapture their edge on home ice as the Thunder finished the regular season 22-16-3 under Thomas, and 14-10-2 at Stockton Arena.

Still, there was much more to be had than regular season accomplishments, and targets were set on the Reign, who won the West in their first season. What followed was one of the most wild and dramatic series in Kelly Cup Playoff history. Five games were decided by one goal, one game went to overtime and the series went to Game 7.

Drama that included an injury to Perugini (leading into the late signing of young Parker Van Buskirk) in Game 1, the Thunder knotted the series in a heart-pounding 6-5 win at Citizens Business Bank Arena in Game 2.

But Ontario’s confidence took a daring step in the form of unbridled expression in the media. Before the clubs shifted back north for Games 3-5 in Stockton, it was Ontario head coach Karl Taylor’s single excuse in local newspapers for the Game 2 loss that made it on the Thunder dressing room bulletin boards by saying, “we weren’t prepared to play. We thought it was going to be easy.”

Maybe Ontario was banking that statement off a 4-0-0 regular season record at Stockton Arena. Maybe it fueled their confidence, certain they could do it with one hand tied behind their back after the Thunder dropped a lackluster 5-1 loss in Game 3.

The Thunder decided to prove them wrong.

In came Van Buskirk for help, who only had two games of professional experience.

Making his playoff debut and thus cast into the fire, Van Buskirk was as cool as ice in Game 4, making 34 astounding saves. However, with the Thunder hanging onto a 4-2 lead, their conservative approach to closing the game almost cost them when Ontario roared back with two dramatic goals in the final minutes, a shorthanded goal by Jon Rheault and an extra attacker marker by Bud Holloway to send the game into overtime, tied 4-4.

It didn’t take long for the Thunder to pick up their working bootstraps and end the Reign threat. On an attacking zone faceoff just minutes into sudden death overtime, the first line of Mike Lalonde, Ryan Huddy and James Bates cycled the puck into the corners long enough to keep the towering defensive pair of Colten Teubert and Chad Starling spinning with heads on a swivel. Capitalizing off the quicker matchup, Huddy found daylight from behind the net and centered the puck for Bates, waiting in the slot.

The rookie right winger, who buried 16 goals in the regular season and had his first of the playoffs earlier that night, made no mistake on a one-timer from the slot and rifled the puck over goaltender Jeff Zatkoff’s glove. The goal sent the Thunder to a dramatic 5-4 victory and Stockton Arena into delirium, as Bates was mobbed by his teammates on the ice.

Van Buskirk continued his brilliance in net with 30 more saves in Game 5, sending Ontario to the brink of elimination with a 4-2 victory just two days later, but lost the services of captain Matt O’Dette and Lalonde to injury. Ontario wouldn’t go down without a fight as well and Game 7 was forced after the Thunder dropped another 4-3 heart-pounding decision despite scoring three goals in the third period to mount a comeback.

The momentum from Tuesday’s Game 6 fueled the Thunder for Game 7 and head coach Matt Thomas, who was behind the bench for the third deciding game in his career. With a surprise appearance by Troy Bodie (now an Anaheim Duck) in attendance, the Thunder came out prepared under acting captain Craig Valette and blitzed their way to a 4-1 lead after the first period.

The Thunder followed by trying to tie the defensive screws on the Reign for the rest of the game and the plan seemed to work, until the team went into coasting mode. The Reign took advantage and a goal by Ontario veteran Brad Mehalko was answered by Valette’s power-play goal, seemingly putting the game out of reach at a 5-2 Thunder cushion in the third period.

But two quick strikes in the final eight minutes by Ontario, courtesy of Tim Kraus and Geoff Walker, amazingly cut the deficit to 5-4 and made the Thunder sweat. Yet, a final flurry by Ontario in the last few seconds was stonewalled by Van Buskirk, including a highlight-reel, point-blank save on Jon Francisco, and the Thunder exploded off the bench with their first playoff series victory in team history.

With the second round ahead, the Thunder had a score to settle with the Las Vegas Wranglers in the quest to reach the National Conference Final. A familiar face in net, former Thunder goaltender Glenn Fisher, was loaned to Las Vegas from Springfield.

Looking for payback after dropping the six-game series a year ago, Stockton roared out of the gates with a 4-3 victory at home before a raucous crowd at Stockton Arena. Cory Urquhart’s game-winning goal helped his teammates overcome a 2-0 deficit in the first period. Fisher, who started the game, was pulled in the first period after surrendering three goals in the opening stanza.

Playing in a bizarre 1-1-2-3 format due to building schedule conflicts at Las Vegas’ Orleans Arena, the Thunder gained more ammunition on their

blueline with the return of MacAulay from his AHL call-up. They were unable to solve the puzzle of the Wranglers home ice in Game 2 and dropped a 4-2 loss.

The home ice and boisterous Thunder faithful proved to be necessary home cooking, and the Thunder cruised to a statement-making 5-1 win in Game 3 at Stockton Arena. Huddy posted a pair of goals and an assist, with Van Buskirk falling nearly 16 minutes shy of his first pro shutout.

The team had to also recuperate after losing Blackwater to injury in Game 3 on a vicious knee-on-knee hit delivered by J.D. Watt. Bates then dropped the gloves with Watt at center ice to defend his teammate while Blackwater was given treatment by the training staff and helped off the ice.

Seemingly undeterred, the Thunder found players to step up and fill the holes. An unlikely source, rookie Brandon Naurato (picked up a week before the regular season's conclusion out of college at Michigan) gave the Thunder a 2-1 lead in the third period, finishing Huddy's brilliant three-way passing sequence at the doorstep.

The Wranglers, with backs to the wall, shot back with Dan Riedel's game-tying goal just nearly three minutes later and scored the goal that turned the series around. Mick Lawrence's overtime winner with just 28 seconds elapsed came on a slap shot from the right circle to level the series 2-2 and give Las Vegas a 3-2 win in the game.

The Thunder were faced with a daunting task – win two of the last three in one of the most difficult venues in the ECHL. The stakes were further raised after a 4-2 loss in Game 5. The next night at Orleans Arena, the Thunder staved off elimination on goals by Valette, MacAulay and an empty-netter by Urquhart to put Las Vegas away, 3-1 and force Game 7.

With Game 7 again on the road, the Thunder had been in the same situation just two weeks prior and looked to build on the experience of putting the Reign away. But home ice for the Wranglers proved to be too much for the Thunder to handle and Las Vegas scored four unanswered goals before Urquhart finally got the Thunder on the board at a 4-1 deficit in the third period.

Sean Owens put the game away with an empty net goal. The win would be Las Vegas' final of the year before bowing out in a four-game sweep to the eventual Kelly Cup finalist Alaska Aces in the Conference Finals.

Still, as the Thunder exited off the 2008-09 hockey stage earlier than hoped, they capitalized on a groundbreaking season, on and off the ice. With a fourth straight attendance title in tow and winning the hearts of many playoff hungry fans by getting into the month of May for the first time ever, the Thunder toppled community milestones by raising a club record \$550,683 for charity.

"Thunder Goes Pink III" drew over a combined 17,000 fans in two games against the Victoria Salmon Kings in November and raised over a whopping \$40,000 for the American Cancer Society - Stockton Field Office and the St. Joseph's Foundation - Breast Cancer Services.

The architect of the season's turnaround was signed, sealed and delivered – Thomas signed a two-year contract extension on June 11, laying the foundation to take the hockey club to new and exhilarating heights.

With the growth of hockey in California and the zeal of San Joaquin Valley hockey fans burning hot as ever, the Thunder entered a new era by setting the tone for its loyal fans and blossoming team with the rallying cry for success of 2009-10.

The time arrived to go "All Out, All Season."

2009-10

By taking the next step with its success on the ice and firmly solidifying its place in the Central Valley with a legion of Thunder fans following the team's every move, the next plan was put into place with a team that would play to the identity of Thomas' brand of high-tempo hockey.

Many faces from the 2008-09 roster returned and were determined to build on the success of the previous season via free agency. Additionally, Edmonton returned contracted prospects James Bates, Jordan Bendfeld and goaltenders Andrew Perugini and Bryan Pitton for a second run with Stockton,

while signing former Las Vegas playoff foe Kelly Czuy to an AHL contract – placing the speedy, hard-nosed winger with the Thunder.

In what would be a common theme under the Thomas regime, several team bonding events were staged to build team chemistry, which included a cookout and camping trip to Half Moon Bay at the conclusion of training camp.

Yet, the season began on a turbulent note. The Idaho Steelheads, who would leave the entire National Conference in their wake by capturing the best record in the league that season, swept the first three games from the Thunder in Idaho. The following weekend, the losing streak hit four games after a 7-1 home opening loss to the Ontario Reign.

The Thunder eventually hit rock bottom as the offense continued to sputter. Following a 5-11-3 start, changes were made to the roster.

Forwards Matt Robinson, J.F. Caudron, Brett and Colin Hemingway and defensemen Anthony Aiello and Justin DaCosta were all eventually brought in through trades and free agency signings, helping direct a swift turnaround to the season.

Stockton roared their way through vaunted territory – Sullivan Arena – to record a rare three-game sweep of the Alaska Aces, something that no other team but the 2006-07 Las Vegas Wranglers had done in ECHL history.

By the All-Star break, the Thunder reached the .500 mark and wouldn't look back. With rookie sensation Chris D'Alvise and budding star James Bates racing up the scoring charts, the Thunder were just four points out of first place in the Pacific Division by the middle of February.

They continued to streak into late March with sights set on locking up a playoff berth, but it required a bit of grunt work with the Las Vegas Wranglers looking to take five points in a three-game series in Stockton.

The game – a Sunday afternoon, March 28 affair – looked grim with the Thunder trailing 3-0 and 4-1 during the game and backup Kurtis Mucha thrusting in net.

It turned out to be one of the great comebacks in Thunder history at one of the most critical moments of a hockey season.

After back-to-back goals in the second period which closed the gap to 4-3, a bullet of a one-timer by D'Alvise knotted the score, 4-4 with 7:05 remaining in the third period.

The game was up for grabs. Robinson, scoring his second goal of the game, then threw Stockton Arena into a frenzy for the Thunder's first lead of the game just 27 seconds later when his deflection of a Ryan Constant shot from the point put the Thunder ahead, 5-4.

Yet, an Adam Miller goal with three minutes left tied the game at 5-5, making it a neck-and-neck race to the finish line for both teams.

Robinson, however, had one more bullet left in his arsenal and made it count, drilling a slapshot from off the rush to the back of the net with 59.5 seconds left, upgrading the Stockton Arena frenzy to a delirium with a 6-5 Thunder lead, and a Robinson hat trick.

The Thunder, fresh off the one-goal win, tied for the Pacific Division lead later in the final week of the season and clinched a playoff berth. The Condors would win the division outright, but the score between both teams was far from settled.

First up in the Kelly Cup Playoffs were the Alaska Aces. If Stockton were to get to the second round for the second straight season, they would have to do something no other team had done in ECHL history – knock the Aces out of the playoffs in the opening round.

A curveball was thrown the Aces way though – and the usually vaunted Sullivan Arena was left out of the playoff picture when scheduling conflicts forced Games 1-2 of the series to a smaller Menard Memorial Sports Center in Wasilla.

Yet, the Aces seemed to take the Sullivan Arena magic with them and jetted out to a 1-0 series lead when they erased a 3-2 deficit in the third period with

back-to-back goals by offensively starved B.J. Crum – he had only scored one goal all year.

The Alaska win, 4-3, meant the Thunder faced a must-win scenario in Game 2 to prevent facing elimination in the best-of-five series.

Goaltender Billy Sauer was dominant. He kept the Thunder off the board for nearly the first 40 minutes of the game and it appeared the Aces were threatening to put a stranglehold on the series, up 1-0 late in the second period and embarking on a power-play.

Former Las Vegas playoff hero Kelly Czuy then channeled more postseason magic by taking matters into his own hands and turned the entire complexion of the series around. His shorthanded goal on a breakaway, a snap shot to the glove of Sauer, tied the game 1-1 with less than a minute to play.

Sensing new life, the Thunder then rolled with a four-goal outburst in the final period, putting the Aces away with a 5-2 win that tied the series, 1-1.

The final three games were guaranteed for Stockton Arena, and the Thunder left no doubt as to who controlled the ice surface in front of its raucous fans. Down 3-2 in the third period in Game 3, a Jason Pitton goal opened the floodgates with a 3-3 tie.

On a mission to gain control in the series, the Thunder raced to a 5-3 lead on two more goals off the sticks of Matt Marquardt and Czuy, but the Aces made it a one-goal gap just nine seconds later when Judd Blackwater, now behind enemy lines, scored from off the rush after the Aces won the faceoff at center ice.

Yet, the momentum swung wildly back into the Thunder favor when D'Alvise made it 6-4, burying a rocket from the slot after Bates set him up from the right wing.

An empty net goal by Ryan Constant sealed the game and put the Aces on their heels.

The Thunder completed their historic run of knocking the Aces into the summer the next night, when a wild 8-5 win gave them a 3-1 series victory.

How they got there was no less wild than the previous evening. A five-goal outburst in the first period put the Thunder up 5-3 in a wild, offensive track meet style that had the Thunder come from behind separate 2-0 and 3-1 deficits.

With the Thunder blistering the scoreboard on a combination of ten goals in over 28 minutes, the Aces were left in disarray. The Thunder only continued to pour more fuel onto the fire with goals from Garet Hunt, Igor Gongalsky and Matt Robinson.

Stockton and Bakersfield finally had their match - a battle for the right to move onto the National Conference Final. It was the first postseason battle between the two cities and civic pride was also put on the line.

Stockton mayor Ann Johnston put up asparagus against Bakersfield counterpart Harvey Hall, who offered Dewar's Candies with the winner dining on the loser's delicacy.

The Condors, powered by the NHL experience of Kyle Calder and MacGregor Sharp and owning home ice advantage, yet succumbed to a determined and resilient Thunder team in Game 1, when Stockton won 3-2 in sudden death overtime after rallying with a Czuy goal to knot the score with less than three minutes left in regulation. J.F. Caudron drove home the winner, and Stockton snagged home ice advantage.

Surely, the Thunder needed to be prepared for a desperate effort by their Anaheim-affiliated counterparts for Game 2. Another Thunder victory meant a 2-0 series gap before it shifted to Stockton for the middle three games.

Different night ... and same result. Following another neck-and-neck race through three periods, overtime was required again. The heroes were the ones leaving Bakersfield up 2-0. Oren Eizenman, this time, provided the dramatic ending when he slipped a backhanded attempt through the five-hole of Timo Pielmeier, sending the team into party mode by erupting off the bench.

The Condors seemed buried. But Game 3 proved they weren't going down without one final fight, trying to get back in the series. Bakersfield continued their rotation of goaltenders and the move paid off. Jean-Philippe Levasseur blanked the Thunder in a 3-0 victory at Stockton Arena, getting Bakersfield back in the series at a 2-1 deficit.

Yet, the next two games proved it was a matter of time before the gauntlet was thrown down, with raucous crowds looking to help the Thunder move onto the Conference Finals.

The Thunder faced another Levasseur barrier in net for Game 4 and it appeared the frustration would continue, until Matt Robinson unknotted a scoreless tie with a goal in the last minute of the opening period.

Four goals by the Thunder put the game out of reach in the second period. They pounded Levasseur with second chance rebounds.

The Thunder defense then tightened the clamps in the third period and Matt Marquardt's empty net goal sealed a 6-2 win and a 3-1 series advantage – giving the Thunder a chance to put Bakersfield away in relatively quick fashion.

There would be little doubt left as to who had the gas-powered engine, and who was walking to their demise for the 2009-10 season. Marquardt's late first period goal, a bullet from the slot, gave the Thunder a 2-1 lead in Game 5 which would never be relinquished.

Bakersfield and an old friend, Stephane Goulet, cut the deficit to 3-2 until the Thunder embarked on yet another blitz in the final period – using four goals to put away the Condors with a 7-4 win. Colin Hemingway put the game out of reach with his first goal of the postseason – a one-timer from the slot – for a 5-2 advantage, before both teams traded off four goals to finish the game, which was merely academic at that point.

The countdown was on. Nearly 5,000 Thunder fans, decked in black and gold, went into a rally towel waving frenzy as the clock ran out and the Thunder spilled off the bench, celebrating their first trip to the National Conference Final.

Nearly a week off was at hand to celebrate and then prepare for what would be the penultimate showdown of the National Conference – a duel with the juggernaut Steelheads.

Following another team bonding trip which included televised recognition at a San Francisco Giants baseball game, the Thunder embarked to Boise for Games 1-2 of the series, which proved to contain more of the same painful endurance tests that were familiar with the early part of the season.

Goaltender Richard Bachman was nearly unbeatable – giving up two goals in the first 120 minutes, including nothing in Game 2. It gave the Steelheads a 2-0 series advantage with it heading back to Stockton Arena.

Andrew Perugini then yielded the starting goaltending job to Bryan Pitton – which would be his first start of the playoffs – and the result was a performance for the ages that no other Thunder netminder had ever accomplished in team history.

Pitton was invincible. He finally answered Bachman's challenge, and the goaltenders embarked on a shutout duel into overtime, with the Thunder fortunes riding on one shot.

The battle extended into a third overtime period – the longest scoreless playoff game in ECHL history – and that one shot gave the Thunder a jolt of life, courtesy of Ryan Constant.

He lined up a Matt Robinson feed at the center point position on a power-play, and simply flicked a wrist shot that Bachman had trouble seeing through traffic.

The puck found the back of the net, Stockton Arena went into a frenzy, and a sliding Constant was greeted by celebrating teammates at center ice to enjoy a breathtaking, 1-0 Thunder win in triple overtime, completing a battle of endurance and breaking a remarkable shutout streak of 172 minutes and seven seconds Bachman had on Stockton.

Pitton also broke a Thunder playoff record with 49 saves, while recording the first postseason shutout of his career and the first in Thunder history.

Sensing a chink in the armor of the Steelheads, the Thunder continued to hammer away at Bachman in Game 4. Eventually, the move paid off – on a three goal outburst in the second period – with Bachman also leaving the game due to injury after a collision with teammate Evan Barlow.

Rejean Beauchemin hadn't played in a month due to Bachman's hot streak but was thrust into action at a critical time. The Thunder took advantage by running roughshod over the new goaltender and built a thick 4-1 edge after two periods. Goals by Matt Marquardt, James Bates and Colin Hemingway pushed the game into blowout mode with a 7-1 lead in the third period.

Pitton earned his second straight win in net with a 7-2 win and the series was up for grabs with a 2-2 tie.

Game 5 would yield a tug-o-war between two desperate teams sensing two reachable wins to advance to the Kelly Cup Finals. Stockton and Idaho traded four goals, at one point, in a span of 1:25, finished off by a Matt Robinson snipe in the mid slot for a 3-3 tie in the second period.

Yet, Marty Fichel's late goal in the second gave Idaho a narrow 4-3 edge and the Thunder came back by throwing their entire arsenal at Beauchemin in the final 20 minutes, coming within inches of the back of the net on several occasions.

Oren Eizenman appeared to tie the game with nearly 3:30 left in regulation, but officials confirmed after a review that his one-timer at the left circle rang off the crossbar instead of the back, inside bar of the net as originally protested by the Stockton bench.

Idaho capitalized on the momentum and put Game 5 out of reach with back-to-back goals from Barlow and Mark McCutcheon, using a 6-3 decision at Stockton Arena to put the Thunder into a must-win situation for Game 6 at Qwest Arena.

It started out bright, as Steve Vanoosten and Jason Pitton used back-to-back goals in the first period to assume a 2-0 lead, before John-Scott Dickson put the Steelheads on his back.

He notched a natural hat trick to give Idaho a 3-2 edge in the second period, but Gareth Hunt restored the tie with a one-timer at the top of the crease.

McCutcheon chipped in with a goal for a 4-3 lead and the Thunder had one more period to fight back, or it meant the end of their season. The situation turned bleak when Idaho used two early goals in the third period for a 6-3 advantage, until one final rally was extracted from the Thunder side.

Matt Marquardt and Kelly Czuy each scored in the final ten minutes to remarkably cut the deficit to 6-5 with two minutes left. After one more scoring chance was thrown the way of the Idaho net with Andrew Perugini pulled for an extra skater, an empty net goal from Marty Fichel sealed the game and series for a 7-5 final score.

Idaho would go onto lose the Kelly Cup Final in five games to the Cincinnati Cyclones, but the Thunder foundation was set for its continuous ascension up minor league hockey's hierarchy. Its run to the Conference Finals signaled a commitment to success on the ice, with a head coach at the controls who poured his passion into the team every day.

Off the ice, the Thunder continued to flourish before its rabid legion of hockey fans, drawing over 6,000 fans per game for the fifth straight season. Five games contained crowds of 8,000 or more, in addition to the one millionth fan visiting in franchise history and a sellout total bolstered to 14 over five seasons at Stockton Arena.

The community continued to wrap its arms around the game of hockey as well. A Thunder record of \$656,977 was donated in cash, tickets, memorabilia and other items to charity in 2009-10, toppling its charitable record of over \$550,000 set in 2008-09.

Additionally, the wildly successful "Thunder Goes Pink" series of games in November raised \$32,480 in charity for the American Cancer Society – Stockton Field Office and St. Joseph's Foundation – Breast Cancer Services.

Very much past the "honeymoon" period of a new franchise in town to entertain curious fans, Stockton Thunder hockey became entrenched in the fabric of the Central Valley's passion heading into 2010-11.

It was an "All Out" effort, paving the way for more anticipation for Thunder success in the future.

2010-11

Entering the 2010-11 season, the Thunder had worn out the tag of "new kid on the block" as the fascinating team that drew curious onlookers from all across the Northern California region.

Yet, they flexed muscle in drawing power and continued to entrench themselves with strength in numbers. Over a million fans had come through the Stockton Arena turnstiles to enjoy a Thunder game entering the sixth year, enjoying on-ice success with eye-catching and unique entertainment off the ice.

What had yet to be accomplished, besides a Kelly Cup title, was aligning forces with another local hockey giant. The San Jose Sharks and Thunder announced a full affiliation agreement at Stockton Arena on August 2, 2010, to supplement the Thunder's current affiliation with the Edmonton Oilers.

Management from the Sharks, Oilers and Thunder celebrated the triangle at a news conference, opening the door for the Thunder to receive promising prospects while aligning the emotions of fans between Stockton and the Bay Area.

Sharks blue chip goaltender Tyson Sexsmith, defenseman Ryan Constant (now on a Sharks contract) and a host of Oilers prospect talent in Mark Arcobello, Jesse Gimblett and Bryan Pitton joined a returning cast that came within six wins of capturing the Kelly Cup one season ago.

They picked up right where they left off.

From October 16 to November 20, the Thunder would not lose a game in regulation. A string of 12 straight games with a win or overtime/shootout loss boosted the team to a record of 8-1-4 and stake of first place in the Western Conference.

During the midst of that run was a pummeling of the Bakersfield Condors during the fifth annual "Thunder Goes Pink" event, where the Thunder swept all three games by a combined score of 15-2. Over 20,000 fans packed Stockton Arena for the weekend series, designed to raise funds to fight breast cancer for the American Cancer Society – Stockton Field Office and St. Joseph's Foundation – Breast Cancer Services.

Jerseys were all the rage for the weekend. Fans placed their bids after Sunday's series finale on a fresh "pink" look, worn by the team. Country music star Carrie Underwood, who visited Stockton Arena just several weeks before to perform in concert, was part of another auctioned jersey. Her autograph graced the front of the Thunder threads and the rare item went to the highest bidder.

On the final day of the series, a 4-0 Thunder win over Bakersfield was capped by a third period melee that would turn into an internet video sensation: a goaltending fight between Sexsmith and counterpart Josh Tordjman, ultimately resulting in Sexsmith piling punches and a take-down on the Condors goaltender.

But as any marathon season would have it, a host of injuries (including Sexsmith) and AHL call-ups took a toll on the Thunder. They went into a 4-9-3 slide that dragged all the way past New Year's Day.

Yet, there was a turnaround waiting in the wings and the Thunder won eight straight games after picking up Jarrett Konkle via a signed contract, acquiring Jordan Fulton in a trade and experiencing the offensive emergence of Chris Lawrence and Bretton Cameron.

But there was another rookie, Mark Arcobello, who was making a big splash. Signed to an AHL contract with the Oklahoma City Barons before the season started, Arcobello was the lone Thunder representative named to the ECHL All-Star team for the annual midseason classic in Bakersfield.

With a large crowd on hand and NHL Network viewers watching, Arcobello turned in a hat trick effort – the first Thunder player to accomplish the feat in an All-Star Game – paving the way for Most Valuable Player honors in the game's 9-3 All Stars win over the Condors. The MVP honors were also another Thunder first.

With Sexsmith finally returning from injury and a Thunder team regrouping for the stretch run despite several players bouncing up and down from the AHL, the month of March proved to be very fruitful in the chase for a division title.

To stand a chance, they needed two wins in the final two games at Las Vegas: a place where they had only bagged two regular season victories over the previous five years. In addition, they needed help from the Bakersfield Condors, who were visiting the Utah Grizzlies.

Taking care of their own business, the Thunder stuffed the host Wranglers in both games, winning 4-3 on the final night of the regular season. However, at nearly the same time, Bakersfield struggled enough to get to overtime and gain a point at Utah, ensuring a tie for first place in the standings.

By virtue of a tiebreaker, the division banner went to Bakersfield.

Yet, the Thunder couldn't hang their heads by responding to the demands of the final month. Losing just once over the final 11 regular season games, they were primed for one more fantastic finish as they battled the quick and resilient Utah Grizzlies in the first round of the Kelly Cup Playoffs.

After the Thunder suffered a series opening 5-2 defeat in Game 1 at Maverik Center, it was Kelly Czuy who was up to his old tricks as he capped off a third period comeback in Game 2.

Following a flurry of two Thunder goals and a Utah game-tying goal late in regulation, Czuy took a rocket like, cross-ice pass from Lawrence off the rush and blasted a slap shot past J.P. Lamoureux at the right circle, closing a 3-2 triumph in sudden death overtime.

Steve Carlson of the famous Hanson Brothers from the film, "Slap Shot," was in the Stockton Arena crowd for Game 3: a matchup sure to be a place where the Thunder brought "old time hockey" philosophy from the regular season into a playoff approach.

Yet, the Grizzlies skated away by accomplishing the unthinkable: two wins in two games at Stockton Arena. Utah won the series, 3-1 and sent the Thunder into an early summer.

However, the Thunder couldn't hang their heads. Over 200,000 fans at Stockton Arena, the sixth straight season such number was accomplished, were a part of a 37-win campaign that came one victory shy of tying the club record.

Even amidst a rebounding economy, affordable ticket prices kept the fans coming through the turnstiles to produce the best turnout at Stockton Arena in three years. Passion from the fan base, local Sharks players in the waters and new onlookers coming to the "Thunderdome" continued to fuel the game. Amidst the intrigue for events like "Star Wars Night" and the ever popular "Thunder Goes Pink," the result was 12 separate crowds of 7,000 or more in Stockton.

The community continued to benefit as well. Nearly a million dollars were raised in cash and other items to charity in 2010-11, helping the Thunder further cement itself in the hearts, eyes and minds of Northern California.

Continuing to build for a successful future, the Thunder entered its seventh season in prosperous condition.

2011-12

Coming off the shortest playoff run in team history and the earliest exit into the summer since 2006, the Thunder re-tooled its roster for the 2011-12 season using a blend of familiar veterans and ambitious youth that still had a lot to prove.

Enter Kevin Baker – a former 57 goal scorer and MVP of the ECHL – who brought a nose for the net and deadly wrist shot. Matt Foy (Minnesota Wild) and newly minted captain Jason Morgan (five NHL teams) rounded out the veteran bunch with big league experience – an important ingredient to potential success with many of their teammates on their first or second professional season.

Yet, the year started bumpy. It took ten games for the Thunder to finally climb above the .500 mark and a lack of offense seemed to rob blue chip goaltending prospect Olivier Roy (playing under an Edmonton contract) of wins that were within reach.

Injuries also took a toll. Morgan went down and rookie sensation Gabriel Levesque – who rolled to 12 points in his first 11 games – was lost to a potential career ending injury in November at Ontario after a body check by Derek Couture. He wouldn't see the ice again until March.

However, the Thunder kept battling and reaped another player who scratched and clawed his way to the NHL level. Talented center Milan Kytnar, assigned to the Thunder several days after Opening Night, filled a void on the Oilers roster when he was re-routed to Edmonton during the middle of a road trip with the Thunder in January.

He became the eighth player in Thunder history to make his NHL debut and impressively accomplished the feat against the New Jersey Devils on Jan. 11 – also on very little sleep.

The season seemed to move at a stagnant pace with a 15-17-4 record staring the team in the face on Jan. 21. Maybe it was the timing of the season, maybe it was another NHL experienced talent (this time Sharks goaltender Alex Stalock) coming to the Central Valley, or maybe it was just pure urgency, but the Thunder finally woke up.

Stalock, who was assigned by San Jose on a conditioning assignment, helped treat over 7,400 fans to a wild victory on Teddy Bear Toss Night which ignited an 8-1-0 Thunder run in nine games.

Add the return of Kytnar and a healthy Chris D'Alvise (who saw his previous season end prematurely with injuries) – and the Thunder suddenly became a well oiled machine that struck fear in the hearts of the ECHL opposition.

As usual, fans of all ages kept pouring into the glass encased Stockton Arena – which still seemed to glisten in its seventh year of operation – and it produced the seventh straight year of over 200,000 fans to see Thunder hockey boom in the Central Valley.

The Thunder finished at a 34-33-5 record for the season, but continued to capture the hearts of fans in the area. Additionally, they finally had the on-ice battle plans ready for the Kelly Cup Playoffs in time with an offense designed to capitalize, a defense that proved relentless and goaltending that fashioned a game changing save when needed. Factoring in the gains of Max Campbell, Ryan Lowery and Rob Kwiet through various trades and AHL assignments, the Thunder was primed for another thrilling run into the depths of the postseason.

In the first round, they proved to be too much for the Colorado Eagles, who boasted numerous banners of league, conference and division championships from the Central Hockey League, but now faced the harsh realities of a brave new world at the ECHL level.

Game 1 proved to be no contest as Roy came within minutes of a shutout and three unanswered goals helped the Thunder cruise to a 3-1 victory in the best of five opener at Stockton Arena.

The next evening wasn't so easy. Colorado built a 2-0 lead early in the first period and their goaltending counterpart, Kyle Jones, seemed to be sharper than the rocky Game 1 output.

Yet, the never-say-die Thunder were up to their old tricks. With Owner Brad Rowbotham in attendance, Campbell began the comeback magic with a second period goal and followed up with a rocket past Jones, late in regulation to tie the game.

It took just 17 seconds into overtime for D'Alvise to throw down the gauntlet. His redirection at the net (courtesy of a Baker centering pass) eluded Jones, sent Stockton Arena into madness and D'Alvise at the bottom of a pile of gold clad teammates at center ice. Stockton won 3-2 and took a 2-0 series lead.

Loveland, Colorado became the scene of Thunder ecstasy and Eagles agony just two days later. Campbell added two more goals and the Thunder never trailed. But they needed to hold off a desperate Colorado push in the third period to get past the finish line of the first round.

As Stockton defended a precarious six-on-four skating situation late in the game, Jordan Fulton blocked a one timer by Aaron Schneckloth and desperately chased the loose puck to center ice. With speed that was no match for the Eagles power play, Fulton converted the play into an easy empty net goal to seal a 4-2 win and the first playoff sweep in Thunder history.

A satisfied and determined band of Thunder returned home for a week of recovery and team bonding (this time to an Oakland Athletics game where they received a warm stadium welcome during the seventh inning stretch). They would need every bit of downtime they could get. Next up were the Alaska Aces, who claimed the Brabham Cup title with the league's best record and two week's rest with a first round bye.

If Game 1 at the vaunted Sullivan Arena proved anything, the Thunder would be hanging with the first seed counterparts every step of the way. Rookie Greg Squires shocked the partisan Anchorage crowd with a game breaking goal in the third period to claim a 1-0 Thunder lead.

But like two years before in similar fashion, the Aces were not done in Game 1. Dan Kissel came back to tie the game and Garry Nunn's seeing eye wrist shot, through a screen, evaded Roy with 3:08 to play.

It turned out to be enough to rescue Alaska, who took the opening game 2-1.

After being silenced in the opener, the Thunder struck back in Game 2 with a top line scoring punch that was previously missing from their dominant trio – Campbell, D'Alvise and Baker.

Campbell started another comeback after the Thunder spotted Alaska a 2-0 lead. His goal in the second period was followed by a Baker bid from the left circle to level the game in a span of 2:13.

With both clubs furiously throwing everything at the net, D'Alvise rose to the occasion again in sudden death overtime. He connected with Campbell on a pass at the left wing, zoomed on goal and sniped the game winner under the crossbar to permanently silence Sullivan Arena – and cue another showman-like celebration by D'Alvise and his teammates at the exit door of the ice surface.

But opportunity slid by the Thunder with home ice advantage in hand. Alaska goaltender Gerald Coleman came back with a 4-0 blanking in Game 3. A painful 4-2 Thunder loss in Game 4 paved the way for Alaska's finish in Game 5, where they won the series 4-1.

With the Thunder's season coming to an end in the "elite eight," the ultimate goal was too high to reach in 2011-12. Yet, the Stockton faithful came through at the box office and tendered a helping hand throughout the season. Hundreds of thousands of dollars were re-routed from events like "Thunder Goes Pink," "Easy Being Green" and "Hockey With Heart" to local charities in the Central Valley.

In all – a season's finish many could be proud of.

2012-13

Head Coach Matt Thomas set out to put together another competitive roster from pools of returning players and new blood that could help the Thunder build upon their playoff loss to the Alaska Aces the year before. What they didn't know at the time was that they'd be on a journey towards the most successful season the franchise would have to date.

Coach Thomas would return behind the bench for his fifth season and brought back a number of returning players including Garet Hunt, Matt Reber, Nathan Deck, Gabriel Levesque, Mike Little and Tony Dehart among others.

One player that would return to the Thunder after spending 2011-12 in Europe would be defenseman Ryan Constant, who would leave Milano Rossoblu of the Italian second division.

Newcomers like defenseman Shawn Boutin and forwards Matt Bergland and Justin Maylan would be welcome additions to the team. Boutin signed from the CHL's Arizona Sundogs as a defensive minded blueliner while Bergland would bring his speed and tenacity from the NCAA's Providence College to the Thunder. Maylan finished a great career with the Prince Albert Raiders of the WHL and even played his first pro game with the AHL's Portland Pirates after his career ended in 2011-12.

Another important newcomer would be goaltender Tyler Bunz who'd be sent down from the team's AHL affiliate, the Oklahoma City Barons. Bunz would win Coach Thomas' starting job out of the gate with Cody Reichard spelling the Oilers signed goaltender.

Bunz and the Thunder would get off to a shaky start at the beginning of the season, going 1-1-1 in his first three games; but after the less than stellar start, the team rattled off six straight wins.

The Thunder's early success was helped by the additions of Yannick Riendeau who was signed to an ECHL contract and the additions of Teigan Zahn and Toni Rajala from Oklahoma City. Another key addition would be a trade between the Thunder and South Carolina Stingrays which sent forward Phil Mangan (8 G-3 A-11 P) to South Carolina in exchange for the stalwart defenseman Kevin Noble.

Just a quarter of the way into the season, the Thunder were firing on all cylinders, posting an 11-5-2 record. Two of the five losses to start the season came at the hands of the newest ECHL team, the San Francisco Bulls.

The Thunder were unable to teach the "new kid" a lesson during their first meeting as the Bulls scored four unanswered goals to beat the Thunder and post just their fourth win on the year.

After going winless in the first three meetings with the new Pacific Division rival, the Thunder had to stop the Bulls and to do so they'd turn to the biggest stage and the biggest crowd they'd see all season long.

While the game went down in the history books as "at San Francisco" the game would actually be played at the home of the Bulls NHL affiliate, the San Jose Sharks' HP Pavilion (due in part to the NHL being locked out).

The game would start off on the wrong foot for the Thunder as Bulls defenseman Mikael Tam would get San Francisco on the board just before the midway mark in the first period.

The Thunder would answer quick, fast and in a hurry with Toni Rajala scoring goal number 14 and 15 of the season just moments after the Bulls initially took the lead. The second period would start just like the first with the Bulls scoring, this time just 1:36 after the period's opening draw, but yet again the Thunder would prove tough and score three more goals in the second period to take the 5-2 lead. Mike Little and Garet Hunt both would get their second goals of the season while Rajala would score his third of the game.

San Francisco would tally two more in the third but a late Cameron Abney goal sealed the fate of the Thunder as they would beat the Bulls for the first time, and did so in front of 12,881 fans.

Just after the halfway point of the season, the Thunder began a "hot and cold" portion of play. Certainly losing players like Toni Rajala, Ryan Martindale and Philippe Cornet back to the Oklahoma City Barons didn't help matters but Coach Thomas kept up with the ever changing roster trading for former Thunder defenseman Colten Hayes and by adding Maxime Boisclair.

Another key loss would be seeing Yannick Riendeau leave the Thunder after 42 games in favor of going to Ajoie of the National League B, the second tier league in Switzerland. At the time Riendeau was the team's leading scorer with 14 goals, 30 assists and 44 points.

The team would hit it's lowest point with just a quarter of the season left to play. Leading up to game #54, the Thunder had lost in Bakersfield and continued to lose, being swept by the Alaska Aces in an important three-in-three series and would drop the Thunder to below a .500 winning percentage for the first time since the third game of the season (24-20-9).

Coach Thomas would have to work the phones in hopes to snap his team out of their current funk. Despite his rights being acquired from South Carolina back on January 25, Shawn Weller would debut for the Thunder at home following the four-game losing streak. Another player familiar to Thunder fans would also return as goaltender Olivier Roy was sent back to the Thunder and would make his 2012-13 season debut the same night. While Weller was held pointless, Roy stopped 29 and allowed a single goal in an important rebound overtime win over the Ontario Reign.

Just as the Thunder were going through a rough patch, they emerged a more mentally tough team, while also getting some key players back from the AHL and even a couple new and eventually, key additions.

Nathan Deck would be returned February 27 after a foray into the AHL with Oklahoma City. After starting the season with the Trenton Titans, forward

Ryan Hayes would be shipped off to South Carolina. Coach Thomas saw the offensive potential that Hayes had and traded future considerations for the dynamic winger.

In addition, the Thunder got Olivier Roy, Eric Hunter, and Harrison Reed all back from the AHL as the Thunder were gearing up towards a playoff run. Coach Thomas' last addition was also one of the biggest as he signed little known CIS standout Andrew Clark in late March. Clark skated in the last four regular season games of the season and recorded a hat trick against the San Francisco Bulls and recorded two assists in the final game of the regular season.

The Thunder would finish the regular season with a 37-26-9 record and finished second in the Pacific Division behind Ontario. The team finished fourth in the Western Conference and 11th in the league. Captain Garett Hunt finished the season leading the league in penalty minutes with 235 and fighting majors with 27.

The team also finished fifth in the league in attendance with an average of 5,485 people attending during the regular season. The team entertained 197,459 fans throughout the course of the season.

Leading the way for the team in points was Harrison Reed who finished the regular season netting 21 goals and adding 24 assists for 45 points, just a single point over Riendeau (Reed only played 4 games more than Riendeau).

The Thunder would open up the first round playoff series against the fifth seeded Las Vegas Wranglers on April 5 in Stockton Arena. It was there that the "Comeback Kids" would start to cement their name.

Game 1 featured the Wranglers getting an early 2-0 lead on the Thunder that would stand until the third period. Just 3:23 into the final frame, Harrison Reed put the Thunder on the board and just under two minutes later, Shawn Boutin scored his first ECHL goal to knot the game at two. The story of the comeback kids began as Matt Bergland tucked away the OT winner just 3:49 into extra time.

Game 2 was more of the same with Las Vegas jumping out to the 2-1 lead in the first, but Shawn Weller's second goal of the game would tie the game up and send it once again to overtime. Just 1:44 in, Harrison Reed ended it and gave the Thunder the 2-0 series lead.

However nothing good ever comes easy and once the series shifted to Vegas, the Thunder's momentum stopped. After three-straight losses (including two shutout losses) the Thunder were on the brink of a playoff exit.

The saying goes "Goonies never say die" and the "Comeback Kids" would come back to Stockton Arena and take down the Wranglers 5-3 and 6-4 and win the first round match-up against Las Vegas, setting up a rematch of the 2011-12 Semifinals against the top team in the league, the Alaska Aces.

A quick turnaround saw the Thunder head to Alaska just five days after the Thunder closed out its seven game series against the Wranglers. While Alaska took the first game, it'd be the Thunder who would be able to steal Game 2 in Alaska and take home ice advantage. Despite being down 2-1 at Sullivan Arena heading into the third, the "Comeback Kids" worked their way back into the game.

Garett Hunt tied the game up exactly two minutes into the third but Bobby Hughes' hat trick goal would put the Aces back on top. The Thunder would turn it around in three minutes though as goals from Ryan Hayes at the 12:15 mark and Matt Bergland 15:15 into the third would put the Thunder on top. An empty netter from Harrison Reed would even the series at one apiece.

With the series shifted back to California, the Thunder looked to protect their newfound home ice advantage. A wild first period may have saw the Aces take the lead initially, but three straight goals from the Thunder (Bergland, Boisclair, Bergland) helped the Thunder take the lead. The Aces scored one more in the first but strikes from Andrew Clark in the second and Harrison Reed in the third put the Aces away 5-3 and gave the Thunder the 2-0 series lead.

Game four turned into a real goaltending dual between Olivier Roy and Gerald Coleman of the Aces. Nick Mazzolini scored for the Aces in the first period but Roy was able to keep the Aces at bay by stopping 10 of 11. His team could only muster three first period shots.

With Roy and Coleman nearly matching save for save in the second, it would be up to the "Comeback Kids" if they wanted to keep the home ice advantage. Just past the midway mark in the third, Eric Hunter smashed one home from Garett Hunt and Ryan Hayes to tie the game 1-1. The game would head to overtime where Andrew Clark would score his second straight game winning goal and give the Thunder the commanding 3-1 series lead over the top seeded Aces.

Unfortunately, just as with Las Vegas, nothing good ever comes easy and the Aces would double up the Thunder and force the series back to the tundra. Game 6 started as most of the others did, with Alaska taking an early lead but a powerplay goal by Harrison Reed with one tick left on the first period clock would at least give the Thunder some life.

Ryan Hayes would knot the game up with his fifth of the playoffs and that would be all the scoring until late in the third period. Aces right winger Andy Taranto seemed to put the game winner behind Olivier Roy with just 2:46 left in the game. "Goonies never say die."

With only five seconds remaining on the clock, and all Thunder fans with their hearts in their hands watching back home, Andrew Clark deposited the tying goal with just five seconds left in the game. The "Comeback Kids" would complete the comeback 7:18 minutes later in the overtime period when Nik Pokulok put the Aces away and put the Thunder in the Western Conference Final for the second time in franchise history. They of course hoped that this time would be different than in 2009-10.

The matchup would be against the Idaho Steelheads who finished third in the Western Conference. The Thunder would make easy work of the Steelheads in Game 1 with Olivier Roy starring by stopping 35 of 36 shots he faced. Andrew Clark, Maxime Boisclair and Ryan Hayes would score the goals on the way to the Thunder's 3-1, Game 1 win.

Game 2 would be much closer as after 60 minutes the teams were tied, but this time it wasn't the "Comeback Kids" who needed to comeback. The Steelheads scored two third period goals to tie the game up and send it to overtime. Just past the midway mark in the extra time, Andrew Clark would net his third game winner of the playoffs and second OT winner as the Thunder won Game 2 4-3 in overtime.

The Thunder looked to be in cruise control with the series shifting back to Stockton Arena but in Game 3, the Thunder fell in their first overtime game of the playoffs with Idaho's Austin Fyten putting the dagger in the Thunder's hopes of a 3-0 series lead. The Thunder did take care of business just two days later in Stockton and with Maxime Boisclair's late third period tally, the Thunder were now on the brink of their first Kelly Cup Finals appearance.

However the theme of the playoffs as nothing good ever comes easy came back in Game 5. In front of a raucous Stockton Arena, Ryan Hayes put the Thunder on the board late in the first period. Idaho would tie the game up early in the second period thanks to Tyler Gron but just under 12 minutes later, Andrew Clark restored the Thunder lead, 2-1. After 40 minutes, the Steelheads were outshooting the Thunder 32 to 24 and needed a strong 20 minutes from the entire team in order to close out the series.

Despite 13 shots fired at Olivier Roy, the Steelheads were unable to break through, and as the seconds ticked down, the celebration began in Stockton, California. The stands erupted, the ice surface turned into a garage sale, and the Thunder were crowned Western Conference Champions after the 2-1 win over Idaho and the 4-1 series win.

Certainly thanks had to be given to Olivier Roy, who had started every game of the playoffs thus far, but credit needed to be given to the newest member of the Thunder, Andrew Clark, who had four game winning goals in the playoffs so far.

The Bruce Taylor Trophy was brought out onto the ice and presented to Captain Garett Hunt and Co. in front of a loud 4,530 fans who witnessed history.

On the other side of the bracket, the top seeded Reading Royals had dismantled the Greenville Road Warriors, survived the Florida Everblades, and steamrolled the Cincinnati Cyclones on their way to the Kelly Cup Final matchup against the Thunder.

Game 1 would be in Reading and would be a real shootout between the teams. The teams alternated goals in the first and second period but Eric

Hunter put the Thunder on top in the third period for the first time in the young series. The teams would continue the shootout, scoring three goals apiece in the third period to send the game to overtime. Just before the midway mark, Nikita Kashirsky scored his second of the game and handed the Thunder their second overtime defeat of the postseason.

Game 2 would be all Reading as the Royals struck three times in the first and again in the second while Royals goaltender Riley Gill held the Thunder off the scoresheet for the first time since Game 3 of the Thunder's first round matchup against Las Vegas.

As the series shifted to Stockton, the Stockton Arena crowd would help lift the Thunder to a lead in Game 3 thanks to Harrison Reed. Yannick Tifu would tie the game up just moments later and would score the go ahead goal in the third period. Reading added the empty net goal and all of a sudden the Thunder found themselves down three games to none in the Kelly Cup Final.

Game 4 saw the Royals score one 7:54 seconds into the game, but just minutes later, Olivier Roy went down with an injury. The goaltender who had backstopped the Thunder throughout the playoffs would not play another minute in the Finals and finished the playoffs posting a 12-7-2 record with a 2.81 goals-against-average and a .911 save-percentage.

This meant Tyler Bunz would be taking over as the starter, and the change breathed new life into the team. Knowing they needed goals bad, Shawn Weller and Eric Hunter put the Thunder ahead with goals just after Bunz had come into the game. Eventually, the Thunder would pull away with Eric Hunter's second goal of the game and the team would win their first Kelly Cup Finals game by a 4-3 final. Bunz allowed two goals on 27 shots after coming in cold.

Bunz resumed as starter in Game 5 at Stockton Arena but the end of the season was just around the corner. The Royals got goals from six different players and took the Kelly Cup back to Reading with the 6-0 win over the Thunder and 4-1 series win.

Ryan Hayes and Andrew Clark cemented their star status with amazing playoff runs. Hayes finished second in the playoffs in scoring behind Reading's Yannick Tifu. Hayes had notched 9 playoff goals and 15 assists for 24 points, just a single point behind Tifu. Clark finished his first pro playoff run with 7 goals and 14 assists for 21 points and finished tied third in the league with T.J. Syner of the Royals. Harrison Reed finished tied fifth with 9 goals, 11 assists for 20 points. Even the captain, Gareth Hunt, finished in the top half of scoring. Hunt's 3 goals and 10 assists for 13 points saw him tied 12th in playoff points.

While the team didn't bring the trophy they wanted home, they made Stockton proud by "never saying die". The team played much like their blue collar town, scrappy and feisty, fighting till the very end.

And in the end, the team completed the best season in franchise history.

2013-14

Even with the best season in franchise history coming to a premature end, there was plenty of optimism surrounding the team heading into the 2013-14 season. The fans still abuzz with the great success of the team and the thought of the team's first banner raising to Stockton Arena rafters in just a few short months.

However the pretty steady and static franchise would be shaken by a number of offseason moves that would bring major changes to the team.

The first of those moves would come in the form of the only Team President that Stockton had ever known. Dan Chapman announced that he would be leaving the Thunder at the end of June 2013 after accepting a position as the Associate Athletic Director at the University of the Pacific.

The moves didn't stop there as just eight days after Chapman's announcement, Head Coach Matt Thomas announced that after leading the Thunder to the Kelly Cup Final, he had accepted a head coaching job with the University of Alaska Anchorage's hockey team. Thomas finished his Thunder career with a record of 163-127-39 in 329 games and won 34 of 64 playoff games. He finished as the Thunder all-time leader in games coached, wins, win percentage and playoff wins and his teams never missed the playoffs.

The search was on for both a new president and new coach to help lead the Thunder back to the Kelly Cup Final and the first search would come to an end on July 8 when Owner Brad Rowbotham would announce the hiring of Brian Sandy as the new Team President.

Sandy came to the Thunder after serving most recently as Associate General Manager for the athletic department of the University of Arizona. Sandy had a combined 12 years of time with the Portland Trail Blazers of the National Basketball Association and also served as Chief Marketing officer and Senior Vice President, Business Operations with the Tri-City Americans of the Western Hockey League.

With a new president hired, the team would move quickly and hire the franchise's third ever head coach in Richard Kromm. Kromm assumed the role of Head Coach and Director of Hockey Operations on July 15 after coaching the Evansville Icemen for the previous three seasons. While with the Icemen, Kromm helped the team transition from the Central Hockey League to the ECHL and assisted in the development of prospects assigned through the Columbus Blue Jackets and St. Louis Blues organizations.

The next stage of transition for the team that hadn't seen much of it in eight previous seasons was with the affiliates. Gone were the Edmonton Oilers and Oklahoma City Barons who had been affiliated with the team since 2006, and in came the New York Islanders and Bridgeport Sound Tigers. The Islanders hadn't been affiliated with a team since 2010-11 when they were affiliated with the Kalamazoo Wings.

The transitions continued late into the offseason as the play-by-play broadcaster since the inception of the team, Mike Benton, accepted an opening with the Alaska Aces. Benton had called 648 games with the Thunder from the team's first game in Fresno, CA in 2005 all the way up to Game 5 of the 2013 Kelly Cup Finals.

In addition, the Thunder also had to replace their athletic trainer with Kevin Anderson leaving the team after eight seasons to become the head athletic trainer at San Joaquin Delta College and the team's equipment manager after Brennan Cody left.

A team that had very little turnover all of a sudden had the "perfect storm" of changes that needed to be made. When the dust settled Dennis "The Moose" Brogna was hired as the Head Athletic Trainer while Corby Antropik was brought in from the San Francisco Bulls to take over Cody's post as Head Equipment Manager.

Hired on to replace Mike Benton would be Caleb Lamb of Syracuse University and Brandon Kisker of the University of Cincinnati, who would share the microphone.

While there was some major, significant changes done to the Front Office and Hockey Operations staff, the Thunder would make news by bringing back a number of players so vital to the team's success in 2013.

Returning as the captain of the team would be Gareth Hunt and joining him from the Western Conference Champions would be Ryan Constant, Nathan Deck, Matt Bergland, Andrew Clark, Ryan Hayes, Shawn Boutin, Landon Oslanski and Kevin Noble.

There were also some important off-season trades that would help shape the Thunder's roster. The future considerations trade that sent goaltender Cody Reichard to Florida landed the Thunder Corey Trivino.

Another deal with the Florida Everblades was the Thunder sending defenseman Tony DeHart and Mike Little to Florida in exchange for Brayden Irwin and Shawn O'Donnell. In a separate deal, Kromm, knowing that Eric Hunter was heading to Europe, dealt his rights to the Toledo Walleye for the rights to Joey Martin.

Kromm retained both Trivino and Martin who were poised to become big contributors for the upcoming season and surrounded them with other important free agent signings in forward James Henry coming from the Vancouver Giants of the WHL along with goaltender and former fifth round pick of the Florida Panthers in the 2005 NHL Entry Draft, Brian Foster.

Before the season began, the Thunder received a number of important Islander and Sound Tiger prospects in forwards Kirill Kabanov, Ben Rosen, Mathieu Gagnon and Nick Larson, defenseman Sean Escobedo, Mike

Keenan and Mike Dalhuisen and NCAA National Champion goalie with the Boston College Eagles, Parker Milner.

The much anticipated October 19 home opener against the Colorado Eagles arrived in no time with a great ceremony that included Garett Hunt skating the Bruce Taylor Trophy out to center ice, handing it off to former president Dan Chapman, who walked up the lower endzone stairs to the fan deck and transitioning the trophy over to new president Brian Sandy and watching the 2013 Western Conference Champions Banner being raised in front of 6,786 rabid fans.

When the ceremony was done and the game was ready to be played, it seemed only fitting to give the fans something to cheer about. Just 32 seconds into the season Garett Hunt tipped home a Ryan Constant point shot and put the Thunder on the board, and they wouldn't look back.

Islanders prospect Kirill Kabanov added the second goal just past the midway mark of the first and Brayden Irwin scored the third tally of the season 5:32 after the second. Defenseman Mike Keenan and Mike Dalhuisen added goals in the second period to put the Thunder ahead 5-0, a score that would prove final.

Brian Foster pitched a 29 save shutout while Kabanov and Dalhuisen would both pick up Gordie Howe Hat Tricks in game number one.

The depth of the team would get an early test after Brayden Irwin was called up to the AHL's Utica Comets. Mike Keenan was recalled back to Bridgeport after three games with the team. Due to stellar play after sweeping the Utah Grizzlies during Thunder Goes Pink VIII, Mike Dalhuisen, Sean Escobedo and Kirill Kabanov were recalled back to Bridgeport. Ryan Hayes, who had gotten off to a hot start, fell injured November 22.

Injury to the Islanders starting goaltender Evgeni Nabakov forced the organization to shuffle goaltenders, which also included Parker Milner heading up to Bridgeport.

In their place, the Thunder were given forwards Greg Miller and Jason Clark while Coach Kromm went out and signed free agent goaltender Brad Phillips.

With Milner in Bridgeport it became the Brian Foster show, and as one of the top goaltenders in the ECHL to start the season, Foster would finally earn recognition. On November 26, Foster was named the CCM ECHL Goalie of the Week for the week of November 18-24 after going 3-0-0 during the week and posting a 1.33 goals-against-average and a .954 save-percentage. At the time, Foster had yet to lose in regulation, posting an impressive 9-0-1 record to start the 2013-14 campaign.

However, the rollercoaster ride began to dip slightly as the team hit the quarter mark of the young campaign, the team followed up a four game winning streak with a five game losing streak including Foster's first regulation loss on November 29.

One of the teams causing some early season trouble for the Thunder was the Pacific Division leading Ontario Reign. The Ontario side proved a tough side to beat early in the season thanks in part to the play of the masked man, Michael Hutchinson. Hutchinson was able to help his side take down the Thunder four times in just a quarter of a season, including two shootout losses.

As December got off to a shaky start, Kromm would get some reinforcements back as Nick Larson and Mike Dalhuisen were sent back to the Thunder from the AHL.

Kromm, knowing he needed help on the blueline, dealt Brayden Irwin to the Greenville Road Warriors for defenseman Lee Baldwin on December 16. Just a day later, goaltender Parker Milner was returned to the Thunder while Brad Phillips was traded to the Gwinnett Gladiators.

Little did the team know at the time but they'd be losing a very important. After a big weekend of hockey, posting 4 goals, 5 assists and 8 points in two games, Andrew Clark would be named the Sher-Wood Hockey ECHL Player of the Week, and earned a Professional Try-Out contract with the Bridgeport Sound Tigers.

A tough three-in-three series against the Ontario Reign started off the way the series had gone throughout the season so far, with two more losses, however

the Thunder were finally able to best Michael Hutchinson in the third game of the season in Ontario.

Right after the first triumph over the Pacific Division leaders, the team prepared for a fun new weekend and a series of five straight games against the San Francisco Bulls.

After the Thunder took two of the first three, including a back-and-forth overtime win that Greg Miller would end, the team embarked on its newest trio of promotions.

Taking a page from other sports teams who have hosted similar events, the Thunder allowed kids to "take over". From the public address announcer, social media and broadcasting to ushers, ticket sales, and in-game emcees; kids had the chance to apply and get "hired" for different jobs.

At the conclusion of the Sunday game on December 29 the Thunder made history for becoming the first team to ever allow fans to "paint" the ice surface, which would then be covered with additional ice and the next Thunder vs. Bulls match-up would be played on fan painted ice. The promotion was called "WE PAINT the Ice Night", however, it quickly became known as "The Painted Classic" on social media due to its proximity with the NHL's Winter Classic on January 1.

A total of 845 people painted characters, flags or wrote special messages on the ice. The Thunder received coverage from ESPN, Sports Illustrated, NBC Sports, CNN and many others. While originally conceived by Team President Brian Sandy, it was executed by Vice President of Operations Bryan Boyes and Broadcaster and Marketing Manager Brandon Kisker. Debra Bachle is credited with bringing the title sponsor, WE PAINT, into the mix.

"The Painted Classic" would take place five days later, giving the boys three days to practice on the painted creation. While many fans believed it'd be hard to see the puck, the guys on the ice didn't complain about that, but did say the amount of color could be slightly disorientating as they skated.

Pat Curcio's San Francisco Bulls would be back in Stockton on January 3 for "The Painted Classic" and the game got off to a tentative start. With Sean Escobedo heading to the box for hooking at the 15:00 mark, it took Tyler Gron just 58 seconds to beat Brian Foster and put the first "Painted Classic" goal on the board and give the Bulls the 1-0 lead.

Just moments later Garett Hunt would find Matt Bergland streaking into the zone and a well-placed wristshot beat Bulls netminder Tyler Beskerowany and tied the game 1-1.

After a scoreless second period, the Thunder got in early penalty trouble in the final frame. A too many men on the ice penalty served by Alex MacLeod was followed up just 27 seconds later by a Garett Hunt slash, followed by a Nathan Deck slash just 45 seconds later.

In the end the Bulls tacked on two more power play goals before Landon Oslanski would bring the Thunder within one with his sixth goal of the year. Unfortunately the Thunder gave up an empty net goal and the Bulls would skate away with the 4-2 win, and cement themselves in the history books as the first team to ever win on a fan painted ice surface.

A total of 4,869 people enjoyed the game first hand but countless others were waiting on the reports from what fans, teams and the league had to say. With word that it wasn't difficult to watch, or to play in, the promotion would be labeled an extreme success and in less than a month, the Florida Everblades and the Central Hockey League's Arizona Sundogs would hold similar events. At the end of the season, multiple NHL teams put on similar events for their fans including the New Jersey Devils and the Minnesota Wild.

A day after falling in "The Painted Classic" the Thunder would be back at it in San Francisco with the "swing game" on the line. Having not had a shutout since the first game of the season, it seemed like as good a time as ever to pitch one in the Cow Palace. This time it'd be Parker Milner who stopped 32 shots on way to a 5-0 win over the Bulls. It would be the last time the team ever played in the Cow Palace.

The Thunder took to the road to Utah right after and split the two games at the Maverik Center, but for the first time all season on January 10, the team beat the Grizzlies in the shootout. It took 33 games and four previous shootout losses to register the first shootout win. Joey Martin and Mitch

Bruijsten scored in the shootout while Brian Foster stopped all four Utah shooters in the win.

Just over a week later the team would be back home to host Teddy Bear Toss. Fans wouldn't wait long to throw their bears onto the ice as Alex MacLeod scored the fastest Teddy Bear Toss goal in team history. Just 2:48 seconds in, MacLeod beat Oilers affiliated goaltender and former Thunder goaltender Tyler Bunz to send the crowd into "PANDAmonium"!

The Condors would eventually take the lead in the third period but the Thunder battled back to tie it up and eventually notch their second shootout win of the season. Mitch Bruijsten and Joey Martin again scored for the Thunder while Brian Foster allowed only one goal.

The following night the team hosted the San Francisco Bulls and would fall in the shootout 3-2. This proved significant as it was the last time the team would play the Bulls ever as the team would fold midseason on January 27. At the time the Bulls held the eighth and final playoff spot.

The Thunder series would finish after 22 games between the sides. The Thunder was 11-8-1-2 against the Bulls since their inception.

Of course the Bulls folding midseason impacted more than just the Thunder's season series against the side. It also meant a significant schedule change, some teams playing more than 72 games, and meant that every team in the Western Conference had clinched a spot in the playoffs including the then ninth placed Las Vegas Wranglers.

For the Thunder, the schedule change meant seeing more of the top two teams in the West, the Aces and Reign, and also the Utah Grizzlies.

In late January the Thunder received a blow to their blueline as Nathan Deck determined to go to Europe. He was suspended by the team for the remainder of the year. The team would be sent Islanders prospect Andrey Pedan on February 6, just in time to go up north!

In early February the team was poised for its first and only series in Alaska, but due to the scheduling shifts, the series was extended to five straight in Alaska. The Thunder and Aces prepared for the ECHL's Hockey Heritage Weekend Event on February 7 and 8.

Both teams were to wear jerseys inspired by their NHL affiliates, the New York Islanders (Thunder) and Calgary Flames (Aces). The Aces wore red flames jerseys with a logo that integrated their polar bear mascot Boomer with the "C" Flames logo.

The Thunder however went the extra mile to wear a unique nod to their NHL affiliate and to their city by transforming into the Rough & Ready Islanders for the two-game event. The logo was inspired by the New York Islanders logo with the words "Rough & Ready" in the logo (the y forming the stick) and the outline of Rough & Ready Island as opposed to Long Island. The jersey was white with the blue and orange accents.

Rough & Ready Island is just miles from Stockton Arena. It was previously used as a military supply depot and ship repair yard, but now it's become a source of economic growth for the city.

Despite the fancy new digs and a brand new attitude, the Thunder, playing as the Rough & Ready Islanders fell in both of the Heritage Weekend games. On Sunday the team transitioned back to being the Thunder and once again fell to Alaska, who put the team on a four-game losing streak.

An odd fight broke out prior to the second game between the teams in warm-ups. Captain and at the time, joint-leading scorer Gareth Hunt would be in the thick of things along with Alaska's Dustin Molle. Both were suspended for two games. In addition, Mathieu Gagnon, who was not initially suspended for his involvement, received a two-game ban missing the Sunday and Tuesday games as was Alaska's Sean Curry.

Game four was very feisty as the Thunder's leading point scorer and new alternate captain Joey Martin was hit violently into the boards by Alaska's Zach Davies. Martin suffered a severe cut and left the ice. An altercation broke out right after the hit with Nick Larson receiving two minor penalties and a ten-minute misconduct.

Livid that his side was penalized more despite having a player get injured on what looked to be a hit from behind, Coach Kromm went off on the officials. He would eventually be given an unsportsmanlike conduct minor and

eventually be ejected from the game by referee Ryan Murphy, leaving on the bench trainer Dennis "The Moose" Brogna and Equipment Manager Corby Antropik.

The Thunder were finally able to break the skid, and the bad juju in Alaska with a 4-3 win, before they came back to Stockton on February 15 in a game that Parker Milner would pitch a 43 save shutout against the Utah Grizzlies. It helped that the team was sent back Corey Trivino from the Portland Pirates after his try-out was over in the AHL.

Although the roster was again going to see changes. As quickly as Andrey Pedan came, he was then gone, back to Bridgeport. The Sound Tigers didn't stop there though as they recalled then leading goal scorer Greg Miller and fan favorite Mike Dalhuisen back to the AHL and shipped them off in separate trades. Nick Larson was recalled and then loaned to the South Carolina Stingrays.

Miller was sent to the Oklahoma City Barons in exchanged for currently injured Nick Tremblay while Dalhuisen was sent to the San Antonio Rampage for Adam Brace. Both Brace and Tremblay were then sent to Stockton along with Bridgeport's Mike Keenan and Riley Wetmore.

Another big blow was leading scorer Joey Martin who was loaned to the Bridgeport Sound Tigers for a professional tryout.

However good news was around the corner as 2012-13 playoff hero Ryan Hayes returned from injury and helped boost the team in his first game back, a win against Ontario just before the ¾ mark in the season.

With Bridgeport well out of a playoff spot and losing their best players to call ups to the organizations' NHL affiliate, the Sound Tigers began cycling through a few players that could potentially help the team in the playoffs; but before reassignments could happen, Coach Kromm had to clear up roster and cap space. He did so by trading J.P. Burkember to the Toledo Walleye for undisclosed terms and by sending Mitch Bruijsten to the Fort Wayne Komets for Future Considerations.

After that the switch was on with Joey Diamond and Alan Quine being sent down to Stockton, along with the return of Joey Martin. The Thunder unfortunately were in a bit of a funk as March was very unkind to the team, going 3-9-1 during the month.

One of the loan bright spots was a great game against the Alaska Aces in Stockton where the team transformed for one last time, into the Rough & Ready Islanders.

Stockton stormed to a 4-1 lead early in the second period but the Aces scored three straight, third period goals to knot the game up. In overtime recently signed to an amateur tryout Brice O'Connor found Joey Martin in his first game back with the team. Martin's shot was initially stopped by Gerald Coleman but big Lee Baldwin pushed forward and eventually pounded in the loose rebound to give the Thunder the 4-3 win and snap a three game losing streak.

The roster went through one more restock with Matt Mangene, Jeremy Langlois and Alan Quine sent back to Stockton on March 31 along with the Thunder's own Andrew Clark, who had last suited up for the team on December 15.

In early April the team was sent Marc Cantin from the Sound Tigers while Jason Clark was recalled back to Bridgeport. The Thunder were also able to claim off waivers former San Francisco Bulls captain Scott Langdon from the South Carolina Stingrays. The playoff roster was beginning to take shape.

With all the retooling, the Thunder turned in a solid April, going 4-1-2 and heading into the playoffs with some positive momentum.

The team finished the regular season with a 33-31-8 record, good enough for seventh in the Western Conference. Their first round opponent would be the second seeded Ontario Reign, whom the team had already played 16 times previous.

The Thunder's Joey Martin finished the season tied fifth in the league with 66 points (21 goals and 45 assists). After spending the majority of the year with the Evansville Icemen but being acquired in an AHL trade, Jeremy Langlois finished the season as the top scoring rookie with 19 goals, 41 assists for 60 points in just 56 ECHL games. Langlois finished 12th in the league in points.

In a significant personal achievement, captain Gareth Hunt finished his career best offensive season with 14 goals and 22 assists for 36 points, all career highs. He'd also put in a career low of 187 minutes in the sin bin.

The playoffs were set to get underway, but a unusual building conflict for the #2 seeded Ontario Reign meant the best-of-seven series began at Stockton Arena. The first game marked a 3-1 win for the Thunder, which would give them the home ice advantage, but they wanted more, and in Game 2, the Thunder poured on the offense and beat the Reign 5-3 heading now to Ontario for Game 3.

While nobody knew it at the time it had happened, early in the third period of Game 2, it was announced that Jeremy Langlois had scored the team's first hat trick of the season. The top line, which featured Langlois, Andrew Clark and Joey Martin, were absolutely on fire just three games into the series.

Unfortunately though defenseman Andrey Pedan absorbed a nasty slash behind the play from Tyler Gron and would be forced to leave the game. He did not return and didn't suit up again for the Thunder.

Game 3 saw another Thunder player light the lamp three times as Joey Martin helped power his team to a 5-2 win putting the Reign on the edge of elimination. However just as the team was rocking some good luck, they got another blow in the form of an injury to Jeremy Langlois. Langlois had put up 4 goals and 5 assists in three playoff games but a hard, legal hit knocked him out of the playoffs for good.

At the time of his injury, the top line of Langlois, Martin and Clark had put up a combined 22 points in three games.

With the Reign on the verge of a big collapse, they had to get on the board first and they were able to do so thanks to Chris Crane. Reign goaltender Jussi Olkinuora kept the Thunder at bay in the second (with plenty of thanks to his defense as the Thunder were limited to three second period shots).

The Thunder needed a spark, and they got it in the form of the 10th forward that was playing his first pro playoff game. James Henry tied the game up just 24 seconds after the puck was dropped in the third period. Less than six minutes later, Nick Tremblay would give the Thunder a lead they would never surrender. The brooms were out and the team had swept the Ontario Reign.

However just as in the two previous games, it wasn't all great as the Thunder would lose Sean Escobedo to an injury and he too wouldn't play another minute in the playoffs.

The team waited, and tried to get healthy, for the second round series to start, and after a hard fought series, the #6 seeded Bakersfield Condors would emerge as the Thunder's Semifinals opponent.

Game 1 in Bako started out great as the Thunder got out to a 2-0 lead on Laurent Brossoit and the Condors, however three unanswered goals would give the Condors the opening win and hand the Thunder their first loss of the postseason.

Game 2 would be all Brossoit as his 31 save shutout did the Thunder in and put the Condors up two games to none. It was only the second time the

Thunder were shutout all season long with the team also being shutout on March 4 by Brossoit and the Condors. The game would also be marked by another Thunder injury, this time to defenseman Lee Baldwin.

However after Game 2 the team exhibited some fight as Matt Bergland and Bakersfield's Joey Leach got into a scuffle after the horn blew to end the game. With the scuffle looking like it was going to wind down, Brossoit, who had left his crease, pushed Marc Cantin who was jawing an opponent. As Cantin gave a slight shove back to the goaltender, his teammates leapt at the chance to defend their masked man. Joe Marciano and Ryan Watson went after Cantin but both Ryan Constant and Gareth Hunt joined the fray in aid of their outnumbered defenseman.

As the fray began to die down again, Bakersfield Head Coach Troy Mann began to scream and yell at Hunt, an action that Coach Kromm didn't take a shining to. The two coaches screamed at each other from the glass with their conflicting views as to what had started the skirmish.

However the beasts were awakened and Game 3 was sure to be a new game.

It took a while but Bakersfield got out to a late first period lead thanks to their captain Joel Broda but the Thunder rattled off goal, after goal, after goal and put up a crooked 5 on the board midway through the third period. While the Condors chipped in one final goal, an empty netter sealed the Thunder's first win over the Condors and brought the series back 2-1 in front of a far friendlier crowd.

However yet again, the Thunder would lose another player, this time it'd be emotional captain Gareth Hunt who would suffer another "freak" injury and would not return in the playoffs.

Sadly, a 2-1 loss two days after their first win put the team on the brink of elimination and even after three straight goals to start Game 5, the Thunder were unable to hold off the Condors and Bakersfield eliminated the Thunder from postseason play by 4-1 series final.

In total the Thunder lost Andrey Pedan, Jeremy Langlois, Sean Escobedo, Lee Baldwin, and Gareth Hunt to serious injury, and once each player suffered their injury they would not return. Alan Quine also missed one game due to injury but did return.

In a season full of transition with the front office, hockey operations department, affiliate, and of course the players suiting up for the squad, the Thunder played a competitive brand of hockey that knocked out the second placed team from the playoffs. The strength of the six (Condors) and seven seeded teams were impressive and showed how competitive the Western Conference was even without the San Francisco Bulls in the mix.

Fans and the staff could wonder what would have been had the team not lost three defenseman and two forwards, but in the end the team would fall short in its goal to defend its Western Conference Championship and contend, once again, for the Kelly Cup.

Rich Kromm HEAD COACH & DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS

Rich Kromm was named head coach/director of hockey operations for Stockton on July 15, 2013. The native of Trail, British Columbia most recently coached the Evansville IceMen for three seasons, serving in a key role with their transition to the ECHL from the Central Hockey League in 2012-13.

Last season, he worked directly with two NHL affiliates of the IceMen, assisting in the development of prospects assigned through the Columbus Blue Jackets and St. Louis Blues organizations. Kromm's resume includes four seasons as head coach of Muskegon in the United Hockey League and International Hockey League, where he was UHL Coach of the Year in 1998-99 while guiding the Fury to a Colonial Cup championship and the league's Tarry Cup for the top regular season record at 50-18-6. He left the organization as their all-time winningest coach (modern history) with a record of 181-92-25 in 298 games. He also guided Muskegon to the UHL Semifinals in 1999-00 and IHL's top regular season record at 51-20-5 in 2009-10. He was an assistant coach for the Chicago Wolves in 1997-98, helping steer the club to the IHL's Turner Cup championship with the league's best record at 55-24-3. He also assisted the Florida Panthers' scouting efforts during the 1997 Stanley Cup Playoffs, following two seasons in the American Hockey League as head coach of the Carolina Monarchs from 1995-97.

Kromm began his coaching career in the IHL with the Cincinnati Cyclones, serving in assistant and interim head coaching roles from 1993-95 when he helped orchestrate back to back 49-win seasons and a combined regular season mark of 98-45-19. His four seasons of junior experience include time behind the bench with the Calgary Hitmen and Portland Winterhawks of the WHL. As an NHL left wing, Kromm skated in parts of nine seasons with the Calgary Flames and New York Islanders, totaling 173 points (70g-103a) in 372 career games. He dressed in 36 career Stanley Cup Playoff games and collected eight points (2g-6a). He was selected in the second round (37th overall) by Calgary in the 1982 NHL Entry Draft.

Kromm resides in Stockton with his wife, Jackie and has four children, sons Alex and Bryan and daughters Erica and Natalie.

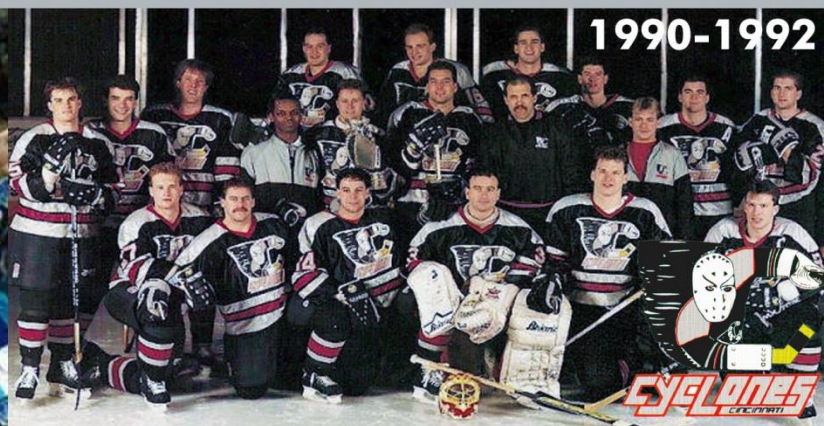

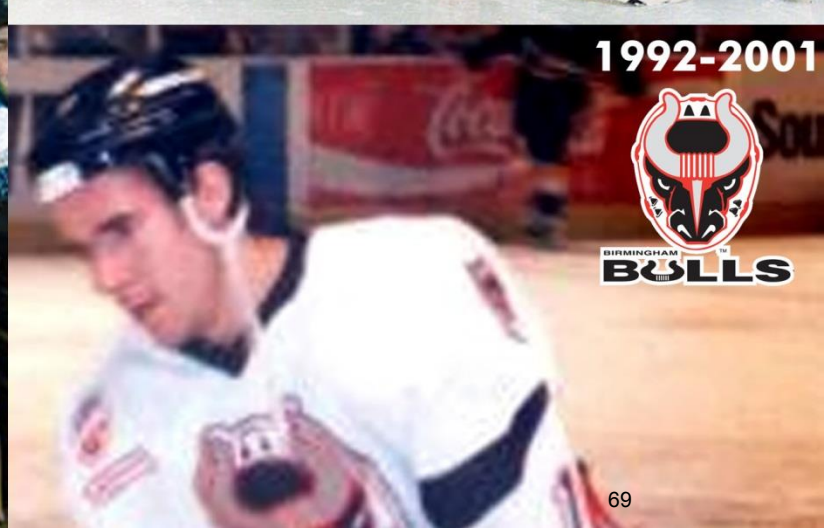

The New York Islanders, one of the most storied dynasties in hockey history, extended its affiliation agreement with the Thunder to extend their partnership during the 2014-15 campaign. This will be the second season the Thunder will be affiliated with the Islanders.

Founded in 1972, the New York Islanders rose to prominence in the early 1980's when they became the first American-based NHL franchise to win four consecutive Stanley Cups. The foundation of those Islanders teams was Hockey Hall of Famers like Denis Potvin, Mike Bossy and Bryan Trottier, who in winning four straight Stanley Cups with the Islanders between 1980 and 1983.

Currently, the franchise is led by Charles Wang, who's been the principle owner of the Islanders since 2004 and part owner since 2000, however in August 2014, it was announced that the team will be transitioning into the hands of former Washington Capitals co-owner Jon Ledecky and investor Scott Malkin during the next two seasons. The task of returning the Islanders to their former glory is that of General Manager and former NHL goaltender Garth Snow and Head Coach Jack Capuano.

Eight members of the Islanders have been inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame including players Mike Bossy, Clark Gillies, Pat LaFontaine, Denis Potvin, Billy Smith and Bryan Trottier along with builders Al Arbour and Bill Torrey.

The current team is very young and very exciting as 24 year-old captain and former first overall pick John Taveres heads up a team with an average age just shy of 27. The Isles also employ Colin McDonald, who played 3 games for the Thunder registering 2 assists in 2008-09.

MEDIA REGULATIONS

2014-15 CREDENTIALS: Season credentials will be issued only to legitimate news gathering organizations that cover the Thunder on a frequent basis. Credentials are the property of Stockton Thunder Professional Hockey and may be revoked at any time. **CREDENTIALS MUST BE WORN AND VISIBLE AT ALL TIMES.**

DAILY/PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued in lieu of those who do not qualify for season credentials. Initial request for a daily credential must be submitted to the Thunder media relations department by e-mail, fax or on company letterhead no later than 5:00 p.m. PST of the day prior to the requested game. Transferring of credentials is strictly prohibited and will result in dismissal of the media member from Stockton Arena, and confiscation of credential for the remainder of the 2014-15 season.

CREDENTIAL PICK-UP: Credentials will be available for pick-up on the day of game at Stockton Arena's employee entrance, located on the south side of Stockton Arena, beginning two hours before game time. You must present a valid form of identification (i.e. driver's license, media outlet employee badge) to claim your credential.

PARKING: Complimentary media parking space, located in the North Lot of Stockton Arena, is extremely limited and will be granted on a "first-come, first-serve" basis. Media requesting individual parking passes must confirm with the Thunder Media Relations department no later than 5:00 p.m. PST of the day prior to the requested game. Television production trucks/vans requiring a patch bay may park in the loading dock of Stockton Arena and must confirm space with the Thunder Media Relations department a week in advance of the game.

PRESS ROW: Press seating is located above section 118, located on the south side of the arena. **ABSOLUTELY NO ALCOHOL CAN BE CONSUMED ON PRESS ROW.** All seating is assigned to credentialed media covering the game. ** NOTE: No individual skater/goaltender statistics apply for the shootout

Assist	An assist is awarded to the player or players (maximum of two) who touched the puck prior to the goal, provided no defender plays or possesses the puck in between.
Coaches Record	A coach receives a "W" for a win in regulation, overtime or shootout; an "L" for a loss in regulation; or an "OT" for a loss in overtime or shootout.
Game Played	A player receives credit for playing in a game if: i) he steps on the ice during time played or; ii) serves any penalty.
Game-Winning Goal	After the final score has been determined, the goal which leaves the winning Club one goal ahead of its opponent is the game-winning goal (example: if Team A beats Team B 8-3, the player scoring the fourth goal for Team A receives credit for the game-winning goal).
Goal.....	A goal is awarded to the last player on the scoring Club to touch the puck prior to the puck entering the net.
Goals-Against Average.....	Multiply goals against (GA) by 60 and divide by total minutes played (MINS).
Goaltender Record	A goaltender receives a "W" for a win in regulation, overtime or shootout; an "L" for a loss in regulation; or an "OT" for a loss in overtime or shootout.
Penalty-Killing Pct.....	Subtract total number of power-play goals allowed from total number of shorthanded situations to get total number of power-plays killed. Divide the total number of power-plays killed by the total number of shorthanded situations.
Plus-Minus.....	A player receives a "plus" if he is on the ice when his Club scores an even-strength or shorthand goal. He receives a "minus" if he is on the ice for an even-strength or shorthanded goal scored by the opposing Club. The difference in these numbers is considered the player's plus-minus statistic.
Power-Play Goal.....	A goal scored by a Club while it has a manpower advantage due to an opponent's penalty. Following are some examples of what is and is not considered a power-play goal: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • if a Club has an advantage on a minor penalty starting at 2:02 of the period and it scores at 4:02, the goal is <i>not</i> a power-play goal. • if a Club scores on a delayed penalty, the goal is <i>not</i> a power-play goal. • if a Club has an advantage due to a five-minute major or match penalty, that Club is always credited with having one more advantage than the number of power-play goals it scores during that advantage, because the penalty does not expire. A new advantage begins after each power-play goal. For example, if Team A scores three goals during a major penalty, it is credited with four advantages. • if a Club is on a power-play for any length of time, it is considered to have had an advantage. • if a minor penalty is incurred by a Club on a power-play due to a major penalty, a new advantage is given to that Club when its minor penalty expires, provided the opponent's major penalty is still in effect.
Power-Play Percentage	Total number of power-play goals divided by total number of power-play opportunities.
Save Percentage	Calculate by Saves divided by Saves + Goals Against
Shooting Percentage	Divide the number of goals scored by the number of shots taken.
Shorthand Goal.....	A goal scored by a Club while it is at a manpower disadvantage. The same cases apply for shorthand as for power-play goals, but in the opposite manner.
Shot on Goal.....	If a player shoots the puck with the intention of scoring and if that shot would have gone in the net had the goaltender not stopped it, the shot is recorded as a "shot on goal".
Shutout	If two goaltenders combine for a shutout, neither receives credit for the shutout. Instead it is recorded as a Club shutout.
Tenths of a Second	If a penalty or goal occurs in the last minute, the time is rounded off to the previous second (ex: if a penalty is called with 12.4 seconds left in a period, the time is indicated as 19:47 and not 19:48.)

MEDICAL TERMINOLOGY

Abduction: Movement of a joint away from the center of the body.

AC Joint (Acromioclavicular joint): Joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the shoulder blade and the distal end of the collarbone meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Adduction: Movement of a joint toward the center of the body.

Adhesion: Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved; or scar tissue which forms after trauma or surgery which can restrict normal motion.

Aerobic: Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired and is required for sustained periods of vigorous exercise with a continually high pulse rate.

Anabolic Steroids: Steroids that promote tissue growth by creating protein in an attempt to enhance muscle growth. The main anabolic steroid is testosterone (male sex hormone).

Anaerobic: Exercise without the use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercise.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL): A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Anti-Inflammatory: Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

Arteriogram: A film demonstrating arteries after injection of a dye.

Arthrogram: X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.

Arthroscope: An instrument used to visualize the interior of a joint cavity.

Arthroscopy: A surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of observation through an arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.

Atrophy: To shrivel or shrink from disuse; as in muscular atrophy.

Baker's Cyst: Localized swelling of a bursa sac in the back of the knee as a result of fluid that has escaped from the knee capsule. A Baker's cyst indicates that there is a trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive fluid production.

Bone Scan: An imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bone injury. If the radioactive substance is taken up by the bone at the injury site, the injury will show as a 'hot spot' on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.

Bursa: A fluid-filled sac located in areas where friction is likely to occur. The bursa sac minimizes the friction, for example, between a tendon and bone.

Cartilage: Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating. Most joints use this to cover bones next to each other. A meniscus is made of cartilage.

CAT Scan (Computerized Tomography): Use of a computer to produce a cross-sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from x-ray data.

Chondromalacia: Roughening of the articular cartilage. Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap, which can occur in any kneecap injury.

Clavicle: Collarbone; the bone connecting the breastbone with the shoulder blade.

Closed Reduction - Re-alignment of a fracture or dislocation without surgery.

Coccyx: The 'tailbone,' a group of four vertebrae that are fused together to form a small triangular bone, located at the terminal end of the spine.

Concussion: Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe, depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Contusion: An injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Corticosteroids: Used to suppress joint inflammation and inflammation in a bursa or near tendons.

Cryotherapy: A treatment with the use of cold.

Cyst: Abnormal sac containing liquid or semi-solid matter.

Degenerative Joint Disease: Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma and 'wear and tear'.

Deltoid Ligament: Ligament that connects the tibia to bones of the medial aspect of the foot and is primarily responsible for stability of the ankle on the medial side. Is sprained less frequently than other ankle ligaments.

Deltoid Muscle: Muscles at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions in the front, side and back.

Disc, Intervertebral: A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

Dislocation: Complete displacement of joint surfaces.

Electromyogram (EMG): Test to determine nerve function.

Epicondylitis: Inflammation of tendons at the elbow due to overuse. Common in tennis players (outer part of elbow) and golfers (inner part of elbow)

Etiology: Study of the cause of injury and disease.

Extension: Action of straightening of a joint as achieved by an extensor muscle.

Fascia: A connective tissue sheath consisting of fibrous tissue and fat which unites the skin to the underlying tissue.

Fat Percentage: The amount of body weight that is adipose, fat tissue. Fat percentage can be calculated by underwater weighing, measuring select skinfold thickness or by analyzing electrical impedance.

Femur: Thighbone; longest bone in the body.

Fibula: Smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from the knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

Flexibility: The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch forces.

Fracture: Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, open, stress or transverse.

Glenohumeral: The shoulder girdle; consists of the glenoid capsule, head of the humerus and labrum.

Glenoid: Cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to form the shoulder girdle.

Glenoid Labrum: A rim of fibrocartilaginous tissue attached around the margin of the glenoid fossa.

Grade One Injury: A mild injury in which ligament, tendon or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.

Grade Two Injury: A moderate injury in which musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally torn, causing appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

Grade Three Injury: A severe injury in which tissue loss has been significant, and in many cases, totally torn or otherwise disrupted, causing a virtual loss of function.

Groin: Junction of the thigh and abdomen, location of muscles that rotate, flex and adduct the hip.

Hammer Toe: Condition when the first digit of a toe is at a different angle than the remaining digits of the same toe.

Hamstring: Category of muscle that runs from the buttocks to the knee along the back of the thigh. It functions to flex the knee and is often times injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility.

Hemarthrosis: Accumulation of blood within a joint as a result of an acute injury.

Hematoma: Mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity or in soft tissues.

High Ankle Sprain: Disruption of thick connective tissue between the tibia and fibula above the ankle joint.

Hip Pointer: Contusion to the iliac crest.

Hydrotherapy: Treatment using water.

Hyperextension: Extreme extension of a limb or body part.

Ice and Stimulation: Use of ice to reduce inflammation and muscle stimulation by surface electrodes to maintain muscle strength used in rehabilitation of injury.

Iliotibial Band: A thick, wide fascial layer that runs from the iliac crest to the knee joint on the outside of the thigh.

Inflammation: The body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.

Isometric Contraction: Muscular contraction in which tension is developed but no mechanical work is done.

Labrum (Labrum Glenoidale): The cartilage of the glenoid cavity in the shoulder. A lip-edged or lip-like structure.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL): Ligament of the knee along the outer aspect that connects the femur to the fibula. It provides lateral stability to the joint.

Ligament: Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI): Imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc and meniscus injuries.

Mandible: Jaw bone

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL): Ligament of knee along the inner aspect that connects the femur to the tibia.

Meniscus: Crescent-shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as cartilage. There are two menisci in the knee - medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

Metacarpals: Five long bones of the hand, joining the fingers to the wrist.

Metatarsals: Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

Myositis: Inflammation of a muscle.

Open Reduction: Re-alignment of a fracture or dislocation with surgery.

Orthotic: Any device applied to or around the body of physical impairment of disability. Commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Osteochondritis Dissecans: A piece of bone and/or cartilage loosened from its attachment after trauma and a cause of a lesion.

Osteomyelitis: An inflammatory disease of bone caused usually by infection with streptococcus or staphylococcus bacteria.

Patella: The kneecap. The patella functions to protect the distal end of the femur as well as increase the mechanical advantage and force generating capacities of the quadriceps muscle group.

Plantar Fasciitis: Inflammation of the plantar (a thick tissue on the bottom of the foot which helps create the arch) fascia; associated with overuse or acute foot injury.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL): A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Quadricep Muscles: A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.

Radius: Bone in the forearm from elbow to the thumb side of the wrist.

Reconstruction: Surgical rebuilding of a joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

Rotator Cuff: Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.

Sacroiliac: Junction of the sacrum, the lower back bone, with the pelvis.

Sacrum: Group of five fused vertebrae located just below the lumbar vertebrae of the lower back, which form part of the pelvis.

Scapula: Shoulder blade.

Sciatica: Irritation of the sciatic nerve resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

Sciatic Nerve: Major nerve that carries impulses for muscular action and sensations between the low back and thigh and lower leg; it is the longest nerve in the body.

Shin Splint: A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

Spleen: Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells located under the left rib cage.

Spondylosis: Abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility, or a general term for arthritis of the spine.

Sprain: Injury resulting from the stretching or twisting of the joint and causes various degrees of stretching or tearing of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint.

Strain: Injury resulting from a pulling or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretching or tearing to the muscle or tendon tissue.

Stress Fracture: A hair-line type of break in a bone. Caused by overuse.

Subluxation: Partial dislocation of a joint. The term usually implies that the joint can return to a normal position without formal reduction.

Synovial Fluid: Lubricating fluid for joints and tendons, produced in synovium, or the inner lining of a joint.

Synovitis: Inflammation of the synovial lining of a joint.

Talus: The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula to form the ankle joint.

Tarsals: Group of seven bones of the foot consisting of the calcaneus, talus, cuboid and three cuneiform bones.

Tendinitis: Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

Tendon: Tissue that connects muscle to bone.

Tenosynovitis: Swelling or inflammation of a tendon sheath caused by calcium deposits, repeated strain or trauma.

Tibia: Shin bone; larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.

Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator (TENS): An electrical modality that sends a mild current through pads at the injury site which stimulates the brain to release the natural analgesic endorphin.

Transverse Process: Small lateral projection off the right and left side of each vertebrae that functions as an attachment site for muscles and ligaments of the spine.

Triceps: Muscle of the back of the upper arm, primarily responsible for extending the elbow.

Ulna: Inner bone of the forearm that runs from the tip of the elbow to the little finger side of the wrist.

Ulnar Nerve: Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing.

Ultrasound: An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relaxing the injured tissue and/or disperse edema...Also a type of imaging study for certain body areas.

"Wind Knocked Out": Syndrome describing a contraction of the abdominal nerve trunk, the solar plexus, as a result of an abdominal contusion.

DID YOU KNOW?

OVERTIME PROCEDURES

"If the score is tied at the end of regulation time, each team will receive one point in the league standings. Team will then play an additional five-minute sudden death overtime period. The first team to score during that time will be declared the winner, and be awarded an additional point.

During the overtime period, teams will skate 4-on-4 with one goaltender. If a team is penalized, teams play 4-on-3. A team is allowed to pull its goaltender in favor of an additional skater in overtime. However, should that team lose the game while the goaltender is removed for an extra attacker, it would forfeit the automatic point gained in the tie at the end of regulation play. The exception is if a goaltender was removed during a delayed penalty. "

SHOOTOUT PROCEDURES

"If no team scores in the five-minute OT period, then a shootout will occur. (The winner of the shootout will be awarded the additional point.)

Five players from each team will participate in the shootout, with the shootout lineup decided by each team's coach. Any player may participate in the shootout unless he has been ejected for a game misconduct, gross misconduct or match penalty during the game.

The home team may decide whether it wants to shoot first, or defend first.

The team with the winning shootout score at the end of the "best-of-five" round session will be awarded the game's final goal and declared the winner. A player who scores a goal during the shootout will not have the goal counted toward his regular season scoring totals. Individual goals and shots taken during the shootout are not counted toward the team's totals for the game and toward the goaltender's save percentage, goals-against-average and shot total.

The game-winning goal in a shootout is credited as a "team goal" and thus is not credited to an individual player, nor does it count against the individual goaltender."

If both teams have scored, the same number of goals after each of the five players have taken a penalty shot, each team will choose another skater to take the penalty shot. (This skater cannot be one of the original five skaters.) This is a sudden death situation with the team who originally shot first always taking the first shot. The procedure will continue until a winner is declared.

PLAYOFF OVERTIME FORMAT

No shootouts will be played in the postseason. If the score is tied after regulation during a playoff game, teams will proceed to 20-minute sudden death overtime periods to determine the outcome of the game. The teams will continue to play overtime periods until the game is decided. During overtime, teams will skate 5-on-5 when at a full-strength situation.

ECHL TEAM ROSTERS

Teams can carry a maximum of 21 active players for the first 30 days of the season. After that time period a maximum of 20 players can be on their active roster. Teams can place two players on reserve and an unlimited amount of players may go on the 21-day Injured Reserve list.

PLAYER CLASSIFICATIONS

To be officially considered as a "veteran," a player must have played in 260 professional games prior to the 2014-15 season. To be officially considered a "rookie," a player must have played fewer than 25 professional games prior to the 2014-15 season. Teams can only carry a maximum of four "veterans" on its active roster (goaltenders are exempt from "veteran" status). Teams can carry an unlimited amount of "rookies."

INJURED RESERVE

The 3-day and 7-day Injured Reserve slots have been replaced by two Reserve List spots. There is no minimum stay on these lists, but a team is limited to no more than 20 Players on its active roster at any time. The 21-day Injured Reserve list remains. There is no limit to the number of players a team may have on the 21-day Injured Reserve.
